

the mob surrounded the chair of their Majesties, and would not suffer them to proceed on their journey, Monsieur la Fayette exerted himself with a coming spirit to procure a free passage for their Majesties, but in vain. They entered his own life, if he persisted; and their Majesties, after sitting in the carriage an hour and three quarters, during which time they were entertained with the eloquence of the mob, who told them, that "they were misled by bad advisers, and that in a moment of time, it was not wise in his Majesty to take steps that must inflame the jealousies of the people;" they returned to the Palace of the King, and the multitude, after shouting the Roi, were perfectly restored to temper. In consequence of this tumult, the following place in the National Assembly on Tuesday last:

At two o'clock the President read a letter from the King, stating his design to come to the National Assembly. The King shortly after entered. The most profound silence took place. Every one rose. The King took his seat by the side of the President. The Ministers took their stations beneath, and the rest of his suite within the bar.

There was then pronounced, with firmness and audibility, the following speech by the

Gentlemen, I come into the midst of you, at a confidence which I have ever testified.

You have been informed of the objection which I yesterday experienced in my journey to St. Cloud. I would not consent to be repelled by force, from the

occasioning acts of severity against a deputation, who thought they were acting in conformity to the laws, at the time they were bringing upon them. But it behoves me to prove that I am free: Nothing is so
