TRAGIC SEQUEL TO LIMERICK  
FUNERAL.

One Killed and Another  
Wounded.

The funeral of the late Henry Clancy, 4 Garvey's  
Range, who was fatally shot at Singland Bridge  
on Sunday evening, had a tragic sequel yesterday  
afternoon. The remains were removed from the  
morgue at the New Barracks to St John's  
Cathedral on Tuesday evening after the military in-  
quiry, held into the circumstances attending Henry  
Clancy's death. Yesterday morning Requiem  
Mass was celebrated in the Cathedral for the  
dead, and at noon the funeral left for Mount  
St Lawrence Cemetery. The cortege, which  
proceeded by the old town, Rutland-street, and  
Patrick-street, was of large proportions. It  
included, as well as the relatives of the deceased,  
representatives of public bodies in the city. The  
Mayor was present. The coffin was covered by a  
Sinn Fein flag. The flag was not interfered with,  
but the authorities, it is stated, took excep-  
tion to the formation of the cortege.  
When the funeral arrived at Mulgrave-street,  
Crown forces who arrived in lorries dis-  
mounted and intimated that only a certain  
number would be allowed to proceed with the  
remains to the cemetery. Women and children  
were permitted to proceed, but a number of young  
men who were at the funeral were turned back.  
Many of those it seems made a detour, and rejoined  
the cortege higher up. When, however, they saw  
the Crown forces coming on they dispersed, and  
ran across a field near the cemetery. They were,  
it is stated, called upon to halt, and not doing so  
shots were fired. In the course of the firing  
Michael Downey, of Singland, was shot and  
died, and another young fellow, Gerard  
Nunan, a carpenter's apprentice, was badly  
wounded. The Rev Father McNamara, C.C, St  
John's, was summoned, and administered the last  
rites of the Church to Downey and Noonan, whose  
condition is stated to be precarious.

Official Report.

Dublin Castle issued the following announce-  
ment last night :—  
During the progress of a funeral of a Sinn  
Feiner in Limerick to-day the police observed a  
number of suspicious-looking men making for the  
country by a circuitous route.  
On seeing the police the men fled across the  
country, and were followed for a considerable  
distance. The police called upon them repeatedly  
to halt, and, the order being disregarded, opened  
fire upon the men.  
Two of them, named Michael Downey, of Sing-  
land, Limerick, and George Noonan, of Limerick,  
were seriously wounded. Downey has since died  
of his wounds.
