The Police at Cunnigar secured, on Wednesday night,

At twelve o'clock on Thursday night, an alarm of fire
was given at the Ordnance Barracks, caused by the chim-
ney of a bake-house in Thomas-street having ignited.
The 3d Dragoon Guards and Royal Artillery, under
Majors Storey and St. Clair, stationed there, turned out
with unprecedented expedition, both officers and men,
and were instantly on the spot, with the barrack engine,
but fortunately the fire did not extend to the premises—
the City Police were equally on the alert. The Royal
Exchange Assurance Engines were in readiness to be
brought up to the premises if required.

John Hanly and John Ryan were this week admitted
to the County Infirmary, labouring from the effects of a
severe beating, in returning from the fairs of Croagh and
the Silvermines.

John M'Namara, a labouring man at the Distiller's,
met with a fatal accident on Wednesday, by falling from
an eminence of about fifty feet, between two chimnies—
He was so seriously injured that he died the next evening
in the County Infirmary, where the Mayor held an inquest
this morning, on the body, and a verdict of accidental
death was returned.

John Brady, a workman at the Lunatic Asylum, fell
on Wednesday from some scaffolding by which he suffered
considerable injury in his person.

The body of a new-born infant was found floating in
the Fergus, near Ennis, on Sunday, supposed to have
been drowned by its unnatural mother!

On Sunday, a very alarming accident occurred in the
Parish Chapel of West Skull, County Cork. The roof
of the Chapel having been perceived to be giving way
during Divine Service, the alarm in consequence was,
as might be expected, very great. The people, mindful
alone of their personal safety, rushed to the doors with
the greatest precipitation, and in attempting to force their
way out, several persons were seriously injured. One
poor woman had her arm broken, and another from what
she suffered had been convulsed for a considerable time;
not mention the contusions and other injuries sustained.

A sea-weed boat of about eight tons, was burned on
Thursday night last, at Quay-land, near Bunratty,
County Clare, supposed maliciously.
