"The several magistrates and principal persons concerned in the trade and fisheries, are hereby acquainted, that as the same has been hitherto carried on without any interruption from the impress; that on this ground, and with a view to prevent the necessity of having recourse to it, by which the trade and fisheries would be much interrupted—the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty hope and expect they will come forward on the present emergency, and adopt such measures as they may consider most effectual for furnishing for his Majesty's service, in the shortest possible time a number of men, in the proportion of at least one in six of those employed in boats or vessels on your coast; on which consideration the remainder will be exempt from the press for as long a time as the state of the country, and other circumstances will permit. But unless a fair proportion of men can be speedily procured by this mode of proceeding, and who will be entitled to the King's bounty, it will become absolutely necessary to take the most effectual means to impress all persons who from their several occupations shall be liable to serve in his Majesty's fleet, including every one whose calling and business is to work in vessels and boats upon rivers, creeks, bays and harbours.

Captain O'Brien, regulating officer on this service will occasionally call at this port, attended by his Majesty's cutter Landrail, to receive such volunteers as may offer themselves, and grant certificates of protection to the remainder, when the proportion above stated shall have been procured."

COUNTERFEITS.—Bank of England five shilling dollars are now in circulation, which are very well executed, the reverse side in particular, is neatly done—on an examination, however, they prove to be only copper, plated; they have rather a wire edge, and more smooth than the genuine tokens;—the deception will be perceived by trial in a balance, for the real kind weigh from 17dwt. 4grs. to 17dwt. 8grs. each, but the counterfeits only about 15dwt. 16grs.
