Stipend Scheme.

A meeting of the Diocesan Council was held in
the Diocesan Hall on April 27th, the Dean of
Limerick as Commissary in the chair, to consider
the scheme drawn up by a Sub-Committee to be
submitted to the Commissioners in accordance
with the recent statutes. The scheme, having
been amended in two cases, was adopted. The
scheme provides for the stipends of the Incumbents
being raised to a minimum of £400 and a maximum
of £600.

DEATH OF MR P. J. COLL, Clerk of Kilmallock Union

CONSTABLE FATALLY SHOT IN CORK.
