"That after a strict and particular enquiry, we are of opinion, the boats were sent under a general impression that the chase was a merchant schooner, and that however unfortunate the result, the attack was made and conducted with a gallantry of spirit which reflects the highest credit and honor to all the officers and men employed in it.

"Cove of Cork, 8th March, 1811."

The loss of the British on the above occasion was 22 killed, and 88 wounded, of which latter 18 were much disabled.
