Alderman O'Gorman presided this day at the meeting of the Guardians, when the report of the Infirmary committee was read, again representing to the Commissioners the expediency of increasing the salary of the medical officers from £40 to £60 per annum each, and Mr. Raleigh withdrew his motion for having but one physician to the establishment. In the house this day—1240.

Tuesday night, a fine house, two stories high, slated, and well finished, value for £500 pounds, the property of Andrew Johnston, Esq. situated at Corboy, Longford, on the Dublin road, was maliciously burned to the ground. The fire was first noticed by the passengers on the down-mail coach.

Mr. C. A. Brew, of Ennis, claims the merit of inventing the application of glass pipes for the conveyance of water.

Mr. Irwin's *Old Ireland* won the handicap at Chester, on Friday, and Capt. Peyton's *Estempore*, a match for £200. Mr. Skerratt's *Intrepid* (winner of the Cup) also ran away with the Cheshire stakes. Mr. Gully withdrew the objection to *Intrepid*, on the Cup. Mr. Skerratt bred the horse, and possess the sire and dam. He wins a good sum by the event—£10,000, including the stake. The setting, one of the heaviest ever known on the Chester Cup, on the whole has been satisfactory.
