From Gottenburgh it is stated, that intelligence was expected to transpire in a few days to the proceedings in the Diet. It was reported, that peace between Sweden and Prussia was one of the first objects under consideration at that assembly. More French privateers captured by the Swedish cruisers. A Swedish vessel arrived in England in the packet, with disapprobation of the Government.

ENGLAND.—The spirit of riot and disorder, is not only unsubdued, but has assumed a form of very serious and alarming nature. General Maitland has set off from London to take the command of the district of Manchester, will have a force altogether of 10,000 men. A commission was making out, for the Judges to try the rioters in Cheshire and Lancashire.

The Government have prohibited the exportation of iron from the ports of Russia. The first respectability left London for Paris direct, in order to open a Negotiation between the two countries for a more extensive System, and for the revival of commerce. *Star, May 9.*

A letter from Nenagh, May 13, 1812:—On the morning of the 13th, three Revenue Officers and a party of the Barron Battalion, proceeded from this town, to a large Island in the Shannon, to seize a large quantity of malt, spirits, and other articles, from the Island the party consisted of a number of people, fortunately without the Revenue Officers not being able to procure to bring their entire party over to the Island, were obliged to leave a few of the military who were attacked, overpowered, and the country people, who assembled in numbers, armed with pitch-forks &c. Three of the military were wounded by the people. A large quantity of Malt, and Spirits, were destroyed, for want of cars to bring them to the shore.

John Pinkerton was on Friday last, unanimously elected Treasurer to the Dispensary, Humane Society for the relief of the Ruptured and Wounded of the Rev. Thomas Shepherd, dec. The inhabitants of Castlebar was intended on Friday last, at the court-house, in a subscription for the benefit of the poor.

The inhabitants of Castlebar, experienced a considerable quantity of rain, on Saturday last. The wind freshened on Friday and Saturday, fell, to 5d per stone, and a great quantity of it was disposed of at night. Oatmeal, which was at 28s. per cwt. came down to 15s. and to fall from 13s. 6d. to 10s. 6d. per cwt.

The name of Gallagher a gardener near Castlebar, suddenly on Thursday evening, when he was attending to the funeral of his daughter, who was in a violent indisposition, had expired in the arms of his friends, and was interred on the same day.—Continued.

The prisoner, without any other plea, pleaded guilty; but it was proved, in evidence, that he had long been insane, and a verdict accordingly. On being informed of his rashness, he said he shot her. She was his servant.

Constructed upon a philosophical consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and confirmed by the experience of many years actual observation, will without trouble, suggest to the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the Moon's entrance into any one of her quarters—and that so near the truth, that in very few instances will it be found to fail.

Hence, the nearer the time of the Moon's entrance at full and change, and quarters, is to midnight, (that is, within two hours before or after midnight,) the more fair the weather is in the Summer. But the nearer to noon the less fair. Also, the Moon's entrance at full change, and quarters, during six of the afternoon hours, viz. from 4 to 10, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind. The same entrance during all the hours after midnight, except the two first, is unfavorable to fair weather. The like nearly may be observed in Winter.
