PERANCE—Mr. Bermingham, the talented and highly regarded R.C. Pastor of Borrisokane, has published a memoir of the Very Rev. On Thursday, at his lodgings in Mungret-street, John Unthank, Esq. M. D. in the 89th year of his age, long esteemed father of the Faculty. Dr. Unthank was a steadfast member of the Society of Friends, and had been, for sixty years, a most successful medical practitioner in this his native City. With much intellectual power, and all the scientific acquisitions of his time, he united an active and comprehensive benevolence for his fellow man, of all creeds and in all climes. Amongst the strenuous advocates for the abolition of slavery, he was at once ardent and conspicuous, and frequently made large contributions from his ample fortune to defray the occasional expenses which were incurred in the prosecution of that hallowed cause to its final completion. This respected gentleman had been long a widower, but has left no children; the distressed and deserving he contemplated as his family, and they were always generously considered and kindly relieved by his bounty. To all the public charities he was a constant and liberal contributor; and a great portion of the wealth he had amassed by his profession was disposed of in gratuities for the maintenance of useful institutions, founding asylums, and enabling persons who were worthy of his esteem to establish themselves in business. His nephew, Robert Simpson Unthank, Esq. (who is so much admired for his social and agreeable qualities, and to whom his uncle was fondly attached, and has been left his sole legatee, and will therefore inherit his property.
