by performing his duty, made his former friends not only his enemies, but his malignant enemies. He was fatisfied in the discharge of his duty to his country, and in his having supported its constitution, and warned the people against the example of France, which was destructive of liberty, subversive of property, and ruinous to that and other countries.

He remarked upon the discipline and good order of the Rt. hon. gentleman's troops, but did not think it friendly, though it was a fine display of generalship to come down upon him with his heavy artillery, after he had been greatly exhaufted by the haraffing of the light corps. He again afferted the conflicution to be in danger, and called for timely checks. When clubs of men are suffered to meet and correspond with France; when regular anniversaries are permitted to commemorate fuch events as have happened in France, then the country is in danger; when such plots and conspiracies are going on; when feditions and rebellious fermons are delivered from pulpits; when the King's right to the throne is openly disputed; and when a bank of fedition is established in the heart of the country, the house ought totake fire and destroy

Urging this point at some length, he again noticed the French constitution, which he faid was the worst that could have been formed by the united folly and wickedness of man; it was a basetels fabric ; it was a confliturion supported by the worst and most dreadful tyranny; every step taken by them to liberty, facrificed order, and every flep to order facrificed liberty and properry. He concluded by moving an amendment to the motion, to omit the words after Differention, for the purpole of inferting se tending to flew that examples from the faid confirmation of France, to prove the fame inefficient for every good purpole, and tending to anarchy, confusion, and the distruction of liberty and property, is applicable to the queftion before the committee."

Mr. Fox role: having laboured for fome time in an agony of perturbation, he at length burffed into tears, which arreited the feelings and sympathy, in a particular and affecting manner, of the whole house; when the first emotions subfided, he attempted to speak, but was a fecond time prevented by an effution of tears, which deeply affected all prefent, however, with some difficulty he proceeded to declare, that notwithstanding what had possed that day, he could not give up a friendship that had exitted for twenty-five years. He replied to many parts of Mr. Burke's fpeech, and concluded by declaring, that unless their mutual friends exerted themselves to him and the right hon, gentleman their former friendthip, he should not think they acted affectionately towards him.

The question order was withdrawn, and the debate on the clauses was adjourned to Wednesday next,
