The Magistrates of Lower Connelloe met at Rath-  
keale on Monday, in consequence of the late serious dis-  
turbances, the Knight of Glin in the Chair, when several  
resolutions were entered into, which it is hoped may sup-  
press the scenes discreditable to this County.  
At Miltown Malbay, on Sunday, Lieutenant O'Shea,  
Chief Constable, and his party of Police prevented a des-  
perate fight between two factions, Foxes and M'Mahons,  
coming out from prayers. Two of the leaders were arrest-  
ed, and several disarmed.  
On Monday last, the body of a woman named Mary  
Brady, who was drowned a few days before Christmas  
last, was found in the Pool in a very disfigured state,  
from the length of time it had lain in the water.  
A large still, head and worm, at full work, were seized  
on Friday at Clontra, in the barony of Tulla, County  
Clare, by Mr. H. Hewitt, Officer of Excise.
