## THE LATE MR ROBERT LONGBOTTOM.

We take the following from "The Grocer," of  
 the 10th instant:—

Mr Robert Longbottom, of Moncrieff Cottage,  
 Stocksfield-on-Tyne, died on Monday, the 1st  
 instant. Mr Longbottom was partner with  
 Mr F H Ingham in the business of R Long-  
 bottom and Co, Drury Lane, Newcastle-on-Tyne,  
 since its foundation in 1903, as a continuation of  
 Messrs Ingham and Bibby, provision brokers, at  
 the same address. The business has developed  
 successfully, and it is to be regretted that after  
 many years of work, just when the opportunity  
 for more well-earned leisure was presented, an  
 attack of influenza, followed by three months'  
 depression, caused his untimely death. Mr  
 Longbottom was born at Limerick, where his  
 family are well known. After spending some  
 years of his youth in U.S.A and Canada, getting  
 experience in dairy produce, he was for some time  
 in the employ of the late Mr Robert Gibson, of  
 Limerick, whose articles were of such interest in  
 "The Grocer" some years ago. Subsequently he  
 took up a position with Messrs Heywood and Son,  
 Manchester, as manager, and thence went to  
 Newcastle-on-Tyne. The funeral took place on  
 Wednesday at Bywell, St Peter's, and was at-  
 tended by a large number of personal friends and  
 members of the North-eastern Produce Exchange.

## DEATH OF MR GERALD LEAHY.

It is with feelings of regret we announce the  
 death of Mr Gerald Leahy, which occurred at his  
 residence, Prospect Villas, yesterday evening.  
 The deceased had been in rather poor health for a  
 considerable time past, and his death at the age
