The Earl of Shannon has left Castlemartyr for London.

A sum of £800 is subscribed for a piece of plate to be presented to the Knight of Kerry, by his constituents in that County.

Mathew Singleton, Esq. Chief of the Constabulary Force in Tralee, has been appointed a Stipendiary Magistrate for the County of Galway.

Walter Weldon Molony, Esq. Chief Constable of Police, stationed at Cork, is appointed a Stipendiary Magistrate for Tipperary.

William Henry Bracken, Esq. has been appointed Recorder of Kilkenny—he was proposed by Alderman Wenys and seconded by Alderman the Marquis of Ormonde.

The Treasurership of the County Clare is vacant by the death of that most estimable gentleman, Giles Daxon, Esq.

Captain Butler and Lieutenant L'Estrange are now stationed with 53 men, in Mr. Comyn's house, at Kilfenora, near Ennistimon.

Two of the middle class of farmers, one in comfortable circumstances, were arrested yesterday at Clegarav and fully identified as being among those who turned up ground at Ross, when Mr. Lloyd and the Military came in collision with them.

About the hour of 2 o'clock yesterday morning, 12 men were apprehended in the neighbourhood of Ballylongford, by Chief Constable Jackson, and a party of the Police accompanied by Francis Crosbie, Esq. a Magistrate and Captain Leslie, and a party of the Tarbert yeomanry under his command. These persons are fully identified as the principals of a numerous banditti, who attacked the Police barracks at Ballylongford, and demolished the doors and windows on the night of Tuesday the 17th inst. Much praise is due to Captain Leslie, and his corps, for their prompt and indomitable exertions on this, as well as many other occasions since the commencement of the disturbances in Clare, they have volunteered their services, and are doing duty on patrol along the coast, and other parts of the country every night.

Wednesday morning before day-break one of the oldest offenders in the neighbourhood of Kilmallock was arrested by Police Sergeant Dunn and the party stationed there; his name is John Cunnane, and one who hitherto eluded the vigilance of the police. He is charged with being a principal in exciting insurrectionary movements in this quarter, and with turning up the Abbey Lands on 21st April last.—The police had been in pursuit of this fellow for the last five weeks preceding his arrest. Through the exertions of Sergeant Dunn and his police party seven of the most troublesome fellows who annoyed that neighbourhood have been arrested within the last month, fully identified and committed for trial at the approaching Commission.

In reference to the paragraph in our last, stating the attack on Mr. Arthur's steward, at Glenonera, we are authorised to state, that he was not placed on his knees, nor was any charge made on him of bringing labourers from another parish, for there are no labourers employed at Glenonera, but those on the estate and in the immediate vicinity. The steward who is a most respectable well conducted man, very well liked, was merely asked if he gave his labourers a shilling a day, and cautioned not to give less. On Sunday morning last all Mr. Arthur's tenants at Morelands, Concarhee, Knockanroe, and Garrane, voluntarily assembled and turned back those fields of his at Morelands, which had been some nights before turned up by some of Lady Clare's followers. The steward of Mr. Arthur's estate at Glenonera collected and volunteered if necessary, thus affording a creditable worthy example of the good conduct of these tenants, and of their attachment to their landlord, who has endeavoured to adhere to the system of his father, of having no middlemen on his estate.

On Thursday last, between the hours of 5 and 6 in the afternoon, an armed party of Rockites, consisting of about fifty persons, attacked the house of Thornhill, the property of Thomas Mahon Naughton, Esq. in the parish of Drum, in the county Roscommon, and, after securing such fire-arms as they could lay hands on, set the premises on fire, which were entirely consumed.

The Tipperary Grand Jury at last Assizes, presented £12,000 for building a House of Correction at Clonmel—Proposals to execute the work are now being received.

The number of persons who have emigrated from Ireland this year has been greater than at any former period, and the influx seems to have no other intermission than is created by the paucity of shipping offering to take passengers. The tide appears to set almost entirely towards British America, and the old feeling in favour of the States to be quite abandoned.
