

and, from the growing surplus of the consolidated fund, the produce of which fund, for the last 3 years, gave an average of 13,470,000l. of permanent taxes, exclusive of the land and malt he should take 2,110,000 To which were to be added, for outstanding balances, 150,000 For probable increases, as stated by the report of the revenue committee, he should be entitled to take an additional 150,000l. arising from 100,000l. probable increase on Tobacco, 30,000l. on land tax arrears, and 10,000l. on the hemp duties; he would, however, take only from those expected increases, 120,000

Making a total of ways and means of 5,739,471 From which deduct the total supply 5,728,000 And an excess will be left of some thousands.

Having thus gone through the whole of his statement, and shewn to the committee, that after providing for every charge on the revenue for unforeseen and unavoidable expences, and for the annual million, a surplus would remain, he would not detain them by entering into a general view of the flourishing state of our finances, as gentlemen had now an opportunity, by the report on the table, from the revenue committee, to examine into that subject more fully than by a passing debate; he was confident that no gentleman would read that report without infinite satisfaction; and from the moderate expectations held out by the average of the three last years on which it was founded, he had that day stated the finances, and not from the last year, the surplus revenue of which had exceeded his calculation by more than 400,000l. He concluded by moving several resolutions.

Mr. SHERIDAN acknowledged the fairness and candour with which the revenue committee had made their report, and which he said justified every word he had before uttered in that house upon the subject of the revenue. He was, however, as far as ever from agreeing with the statement just made by the Right Hon. Gentleman, and contended that the prodigality of the expenditure exceeded the progressive increase of the revenue. It was not his intention then to enter into a debate upon the report of the committee, but he was of opinion that it contained facts of too great importance to be passed by without particular notice, and on which facts he would on a future day move such resolutions as should draw the attention of the house distinctly and particularly on them:—That committee had, he said, stated the permanent expenditure at 500,000l. more than was stated by the committee of the year 1786, to which was now to be added by the statement of the Right Hon. Gentleman, above even the expenditure stated by the present report, a sum of 866,000l. as casual expenditure, making the total of the expenditure now voting, more than what was stated by the revenue committee of 1786, as likely to be voted for 1791, no less than 1,300,000l.—This immense and alarming increase of expenditure, he said, called for explanation to the country, for though the expenditure had thus increased, he was ready to prove that upon an average of the last five years, the revenue, though under every advantage of situation, had not risen. With what prospect before us, could we then, he asked, add to the permanent peace establishment half a million? The alteration that rendered such a measure necessary, the country ought to be acquainted. He stated that three million of the national debt had been paid off, by which an annuity had been imposed upon the income of the country, by the increase of the permanent establishment. He pledged himself to bring the report before the

THE Honourable the House of Commons having a few Days ago ordered, that the Clerk of the Crown of the different Counties and Cities in this Kingdom, should lay before said House, on the first Day of the next Sessions, returns of the Names of the several Persons against whom Indictments have been preferred by Grand Juries, who have not been tried on the same in the last ten Years, the Offences with which they were charged, and their respective Abodes. Now I Christopher Gaff of Askeaton, in the Co. Limerick, Gent. and several others, do stand indicted in the Crown-office of the said County, as of Lent Assizes 1786, for unlawfully assembling, assaulting, and other offences, alleged to be committed by me and others, against Michael Slattery, James Bryson, Malcolm Cameron, John Love, James M'Quaine, James Ross, James Paulkner, William Swanson, Donald M' Donald, and Donald M'Intosh, near Askeaton, and at Rathkeal, in said County, on the 4th and 6th Days of November, 1785. In obedience to the said Order, and to prevent the Honourable the House of Commons, from any Trouble, with respect to a return of the said Indictments to them, from the Clerk of the Crown of the said County, I do hereby give this Public Notice, that I have this Day, entered into Recognizance before a Magistrate of the said County, with sufficient Sureties, to stand and abide my Trial, at the next general Assizes, and general Gaol Delivery, to be held at St. Francis' Abbey, near Limerick, in and for the said County, for the said alleged Charges or Offences, to evade which, I never absconded, but always since, publicly appeared in this Country and different Parts of the Kingdom, and would have long since surrendered myself to the Laws of my Country, and abide my Trial for said alleged Charges, had the said Prosecutors, or any of them, or any other Person on their behalf, issued a Capias, or taken any other Proceedings against me for that Purpose; and least this should not be deemed sufficient Notice to my said Prosecutors, and all others concerned, I am determined on a future Day, again to publish my Intentions, in this and other Papers, of abiding my Trial at said Assizes;

HAVING seen a Publication in the Clonmel Gazette, purporting that the Serjeant at Arms had not been able to serve me with an Order of the House of Commons, founded on a Report made by the Honourable the Committee for trying the Tipperary Petition—“I feel it incumbent on me (as well in my own Vindication, as for the Satisfaction of my Friends) to assure them and the Publick, that long previous, not only to the making said Order, but to the Time the Committee were pleased to make the Report mentioned in said Publication,” I went from Dublin to the Assizes of Cork, by the express Permission of the Hon. Francis Mathew, for whom I had (previous to my departure) attended as Agent, and that I never after attended said Petition.

Thus circumstanced, I am persuaded that if the Honourable Committee had been apprized of the Time when I was permitted to relinquish the Duties of that Agency, and of my peculiar Situation on that Petition, I should not have been deemed censurable in the Opinions of Gentlemen, to whom I owed every Mark of Respect, and whose Displeasure I trust, I may not appear to have incurred.
