DISASTROUS NEW YORK FIRE.

GREAT DAMAGE TO PROPERTY.

Feared Loss of Life.

Lion Dashes into Crowd.

New York, Saturday—A fire broke out on Coney Island this morning and destroyed the Mammoth Dreamland Pleasure Resort. The flames are now spreading beyond control. It is reported that six babies who were being reared in incubators in the Dreamland Nursery are dead.

During the height of the fire a lion escaped from its cage and dashed into the crowd. The people scattered pell mell, but a dozen policemen emptied their revolvers into the brute and killed him. At twenty minutes to six the fire was under control, four blocks having been burned.

New York, later.—The babies who were reported to have perished in the fire at Dreamland this morning have all been rescued.
