No vessel from this port with passengers had arrived at St. John's New Brunswick, to the 30th April last, when the Java transport for Cork left. The only vessel for St. John's, the *Jessie*, did not leave the Shannon before this month.

The *Harriett* of this port, Atkinson, has sailed from Tralee for Quebec, with 130 emigrants.

The passage of 170 distressed weavers has been taken at Belfast, for Quebec, at 30s. each raised by public subscription.

FATAL AND MYSTERIOUS OCCURRENCE.—Between four and five o'clock, on Wednesday afternoon, two fine little boys were found drowned in a deep pool of standing water, in a quarry, at Carey's Road, where the bodies were accidentally observed near the surface by a passenger, who, with assistance, had them immediately taken out, but the efforts made to restore animation were unfortunately fruitless. Next morning, Sir R. Franklin, and Henry Watson, Esq. Magistrates, held an inquest, to inquire into the circumstances. Dr. C. Peat deposed that about five o'clock, yesterday evening, he saw the bodies of John Gleeson, aged six years, and Patrick Cronin, seven years; they were inanimate, from immersion in water, and had no marks of violence. He used every means to restore animation, but without effect. John Cronin, father of the little boy, deposed that his son left home to go to school at two o'clock, after dinner, and he never saw him until six, when he was dead. Honora Robinson said her grandchild, Gleeson, left her house near Carey's Road, as she thought, to play; did not see or hear of him until he was brought in dead. Patrick Enright said he was at work about three o'clock, when he heard an alarm that a child was drowned in Doherty's quarry; went over at once, and saw the bodies of two little boys floating in the water; crept down the side of the quarry, and with a long stick recovered the body of Cronin. At the same time he saw another man, Thomas Mongavan, shove in the body of Gleeson, and when brought up, they both appeared dead. This was all the evidence that could be had towards illustrating the mystery of the sudden death of these two little children, whose fate, it seems, no person had been witness of. The Jury found a verdict—that John Gleeson and Patrick Cronin were accidentally drowned.

Mr. Richard Moore, Q. C. has entirely recovered from the effects of the severe accident which occurred to him in the Four Courts.
