Mr. O'Connell is keeping his terms at Gray's Inn, with a view to practising at the English bar. In the Irish appeals he will, probably, command a good deal of business.  
Mervyn Archdall, of Riversdale, Esq. has addressed the electors of Fermanagh, for the honor of succeeding his uncle, Gen. Archdall, in the county representation. He is a conservative in his principles. General Archdall was the oldest Irish member in the House of Commons.

Major Willcocks, and the district Magistrates, with William Smith, Esq. Sub-Inspector, and Magistrate, held an enquiry at Croom this week, on the subject of the fatal affray at the late fair of that village, when three lives were lost in a conflict with the Police. The proceedings were private, but the result of the examination is transmitted to Dublin.

The Rev. Mr. Locke, of Newcastle, in this County, is now in receipt of the great arrear of tythes for many months due to him in that district.

Wednesday evening last, Michael Dillon, a labourer in the Thomond-gate Distillery descended to clear out a large vat, but was so overcome by the foul air or noxious gas collected therein, that death ensued almost immediately; and two other men in the concern who followed him down had nearly met a similar fate from the same cause. The Mayor held an inquest on the body next day—Verdict, "that he died of suffocation by foul air in a vat at the distillery."

A poor old man was found lying on his face and hands in the dock at the Wellesley Bridge, at low water, on Wednesday evening last about four o'clock; the workmen had him conveyed to Barrington's Hospital, where, upon examination, it was ascertained that his right wrist and arm were broken, and that he had also sustained an injury of the right hip, and a contusion on his head. He could not give any account how the accident occurred, nor could any of the persons who brought him—he still lingers in a most hopeless state.

Michael Long, for the abduction of the widow Leahy, of Fanningstown, in this County, was apprehended on Thursday by one of the City Police, at Rathbane, and is fully committed for trial by Thomas P. Vokes, Esq.

The Lord Lieutenant has offered £100 reward for the incendiaries who set fire to and destroyed the barn and several head of cattle belonging to Philip M'Briene, near Swadlinbar.

The spirit of outrage and combination by which the principal Trades of Cork had been distinguished during the winter months, still remains in full and destructive operation amongst a large portion of them. Thursday morning, several large stones were dashed into the windows of Mr. Lanphier, an extensive Boot and Shoemaker in George's-street, whilst, simultaneously, the houses in Grafton's-alley, Harpur's-lane, and Faulkener's lane, occupied by some of his Journeymen, (who are rendered objects of vengeance by the Unionists, because of their not joining in their confederacies,) were also attacked. Some of the stones found in Mr. L.'s drawing-room next morning weighed over 6lbs.

Sunday night a herd's house belonging to Mr. Edwin Mathews, on the lands of Knockenea, near Athlone, was maliciously set fire to and burned to the ground.

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
