It has been said that snicides happen in the month of this paper. November more than in any other; we know not that May has been accounted remarkable for assassinations -but it may be mentioned that it was on the 14th of May. 1610, that Henry IV. of France was assassinated by Ravaillae; on the 15th of May, 1800, Hatfield attempted the life of his present Maje ty; and the massacre of the Spaniards at Madrid, by the French, took place on the 2d of the same month, 1803. The assassination of Mr. Perceval within the walls of Parliament, on the 11th ult. has added another distinguished act of atrocity to the memorabilia of the month of May. In connection with this we may also notice, that on the 11th of May, 1778, that great statesman, Lord Chatham, in the midst of a brilliant speech on American independence, was seized with a convuisive fit and died.

It is a singular historical fact, that an ancestor of the late Mr. Spencer Perceval also fell by the hands of an assassin :- In the year 1657, Robert Perceval, second son of the Right Honorable Sir Philip Perceval Knt. dreamed, " that he saw his own spectre bloody and ghastly, and was so shocked at the eight that he swooned away." Soon after communicating the particulars to his uncle, Sir R. Smithwell, he was found in the

Strand, murdered. It is stated, that the day before Mr. Perceval met his death (Sunday), he enquired of his valet what engagements he had for that day? He answered, none -"What not any one to dinner?"-No. "Then I am happy, for I shall have a pleasure I very seldom enjoy, of dining with my family alone." It so happened that all his children dined at home that day. In the evening he called for a Prayer-book, and read the service to his whole family. At the usual hour, Mrs. Perceval ordered the children to bed, but he begged her to give them leave to stay up a little longer, as he so soldom had the enjoyment of their company altogether. When the time expired, he kissed them all, and gave them his blessing very remarkably. A Sunday passed in this manner must be remembered by his reliet with satisfaction, though tinged with the severest sorrow.

A curious advertisement has appeared in the Dublin Day Note, announcing that, " as a subscription is set on foot in England, for the widow of John Bellingham and her three fatherless children, now left destitute of support, her father willing to contribute his mite, will print by subscription, for their use and benefit, a comic opera, in two acts, entitled 'St. Patrick's Night,' written by him at the close of the Duke of Bedford's Vice-Regency of this country, revised, corrected and adapt-

ed for the present day. The author of the threatening letter to the Prince Regent, for whose discovery a thousand pounds were lately offered in the Gazette, has come forward, to receive the reward of his discovery.
