SHANNON DROWNING.

The body of a man, identified as being
that of John Long, of Fedamore, was
recovered from the Shannon at Arthur's
Quay yesterday morning. Some men on
the quayside noticed the body floating on
the surface, and procured a boat in which
they placed the remains and brought them
ashore. Subsequently they were removed
in the Fire Station ambulance to Barring-
ton's Hospital morgue. The man, who was
aged about 49 years, was well built, and had
not been any considerable time in the water.

Inquest Verdict.

Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, held an
inquest at Barrington's Hospital to-day into
the circumstances connected with death.
Sergeant O'Mahony conducted the enquiry.
Catherine Long, Fedamore, stated that
she was a daughter of the deceased. She
last saw her father alive on Tuesday. He
was 49 years of age, and by occupation a
farm labourer. She saw the body in the
hospital morgue, and identified it as that of
her father. Her father left the house at
11 a.m. on Tuesday morning, without saying
where he was going. He was in good terms
with all the family, but was inclined to
worry about every little matter.
