

erday in the King's Bench Prison, which was not quelled without the interference of the military—it originated in an application to the Marshal to liberate Colonel Harrington, who has been eight months closely confined, which was not thought proper to be complied with—and the messenger, Major Pitcairn, who went with the request, was kept a close prisoner. This very much exasperated the rest of them, and they assembled in a riotous manner on the parade, where the Deputy Marshal with his men went, and attempted to seize some of the ringleaders, but they were beat off and retreated between the doors of the prison, striking the inner one after them; they then procured arms, and again went on to the parade, when, in order to intimidate the rioters, two muskets were fired off; but it was not of any avail, as it rather increased than suppressed the riot; they therefore, again retreated between the doors, where there is a small yard, separated by a wall of about 12 feet high;—over this wall the prisoners, to the amount of 300, who were there assembled, threw brick-bats, &c. and, it is said, fractured the skull of one of the men employed under the Marshal, and others were severely bruised. By this time a party of the Life Guards, to the number of 30 or 40 arrived, in consequence of a message, sent from the prison to Mr. Justice Wright; and shortly after a detachment of the Foot Guards, consisting of fifty men, who marched into the prison, and several of the prisoners were secured.

The disturbances in the King's Bench Prison have happily subsided. Only two men attempted to escape, one of whom was shot through the hand, and both were retaken. From the circumstances of the business, the attempt to escape was evidently an after-thought.

The Attorney-General yesterday applied to the court of King's Bench, and obtained an absolute rule for the immediate removal of several of the rioters at the King's Bench Prison, the principals to Newgate, and the abettors to the New Gaol. He stated that the soldiery were yet obliged to keep guard there, night and day.

DUBLIN, June 7.

There was a levee at the Castle on Saturday in honour of his Majesty's birth-day, which commenced at half past three o'clock; it was attended by the Lord Chancellor, his Grace the Archbishop of Dublin, the Speaker of the House of Commons, Lord Clonmel, Lord Carleton, the Attorney and Solicitor General, Prime Serjeant, the Rt. hon. the Lord Mayor, Alderman Exshaw, Sheriffs Williams and Dickenson, several of the dignified clergy, and a great number of military officers.

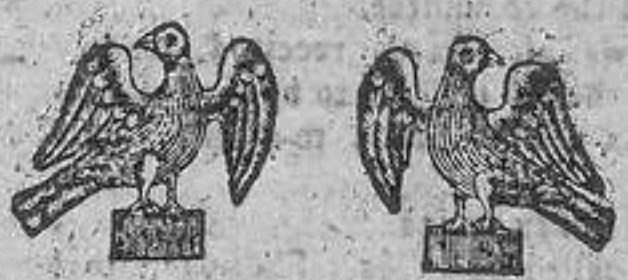
