

Letters from Milan advise, that an alarming tumult happened at Reggio, the beginning of last month; to quell which the government of Milan had dispatched a powerful body of troops with eight pieces of cannon.

About 2000 seamen are all that are wanted for the full complement of manning the fleet, which will sail immediately when Parliament rises.

Accounts were received yesterday at the Secretary of State's office, by way of France, that the plague rages with dreadful havoc in that of Turkey nearest to the Mediterranean, info much, that in a small district a thousand persons have died in a day.

The persons interested in the Catholic bill now before the House of Lords, are about sixty thousand; the number at which Lord Newhaven, in his late pamphlet estimates the disciples of that communion in Great Britain.

The celebrated Countess la Motte was arrested within these few days at her lodgings in Lambeth. She withdrew to another room, from whence she jumped out of window, and by the fall fractured both her legs, and received some very severe contusions.

On Saturday about 11 o'clock in the forenoon, a fire broke out in the iron foundry of Mr. Saunders, in Chamber-street, near Rosemary-lane. The flames were so rapid, that they were almost instantaneously communicated to a timber-yard, belonging to Mr. Mattocks, which was nearly consumed, together with seven houses in Chamber-street, besides the damaging of six others in Abel's buildings. Happily no lives were lost, but a child of Mr. Mattocks' is missing. Owing to a scarcity of water at the commencement of the fire, the engines were supplied with beer from a large storehouse upon the premises. The damages are estimated at near 30,000. Mr. Mattocks, the owner of the timber-yard, was out of town, when the fire broke out.

In the course of the trial the usage and custom of merchants respecting promissory notes and bills of exchange, were fully and clearly laid down, and the jury found a verdict for the plaintiff, with sixpence cost.
