DEATH OF MR. A. WOTZEL.

The death took place on Thursday afternoon at his residence, (Glenville, South Circular Road, of Mr. Akysius Wotzel, well and favourably known in musical circles, and a general favourite with all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. Mr. Wotzel, who was in his fifty-seventh year, was organist at the Jesuits' Church for a long period of years, and he was most popular with the ladies and gentlemen constituting the choir, who sang under his careful and skilled direction, and with every lover of sacred and classical music. This popularity was more than once emphasised, and it was no great surprise. His command of the instrument, his knowledge of the great masters' compositions, his sympathy with any theme he had to pourtray in sweet sound, and the brilliancy of his execution resulted in music which it was delightful, and at times a revelation to hear. He loved his metier, and was indifferent to pecuniary awards therefrom. Mr. Wotzel had been ailing for a long time past, but the end came at last peacefully. The interment took place this afternoon for Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.
