as they marched through the streets during the hours of Public Worship, were grossly repugnant to the sanctities of the Christian Sabbath, and insulting to those who "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it Holy."

The Wesleyan chapel at Liskeard, Cornwall, was burned down on Friday night last. The supposed incendiary is in custody. The chapel was erected in 1842, for £800, and it was insured for £550.

The profound and unanswerable sermon preached by the Rev. Dr. Wall on the Hebrew Scriptures of the Jews, has attracted the attention of the most learned at Oxford and Cambridge, and will become a standard work.
