The Wesleyan chapel at Liskeard, Cornwall, was burned down on Friday night last. The supposed incendiary is in custody. The chapel was erected in 1842, for £800, and it was insured for £550.

The profound and unanswerable sermon preached by the Rev. Dr. Wall on the Hebrew Scriptures of the Jews, has attracted the attention of the most learned at Oxford and Cambridge, and will become a standard work.

The rectory of Himley, Staffordshire vacant by the death of the Rev. Wm. H. Pillans, worth £280 per annum, is in the gift of Lord Ward. The rectory of Moulton, Suffolk, value £500 per annum, vacant by the death of the Rev. George H. Greenall, is in the gift of the Fellows of Christ's College, Cambridge.

The Rev. Frederick Peel, rector of Willingham, cousin of the Premier, has been collated by the Lord Bishop of the diocese, to the prebendal stall of Milton Manorcumbenbrook, in the cathedral of Lincoln.

An Episcopal Church is to be built at Fort Beaufort, Cape of Good Hope.

The Rev. B. Jacob thankfully acknowledges to have received from the Dowager Lady O'Brien, £10; Poole Gabbett, Esq. £2; Messrs. Shaw & Duffield, £2; and from two Friends, 10s. and 5s., for the erection of galleries in the Asylum Episcopal Chapel.

On his present parochial visitation of this diocese, the Rt. Rev. Dr. Ryan reprobates and prohibits the holding of public wakes over deceased persons, as being offensive to decency, and injurious to morality.

Two townlands, hitherto in the parish of Rathkeale for religious purposes, have been annexed to the parish of Newcastle, as being more convenient thereto, at the request of the Rev. Mr. Donovan, P.P. of Rathcabill, and with the approbation of the Rt. Rev. Dr. Ryan.

Father Mathew is to administer the Temperance pledge at Cahersavine on Sunday next.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Collier has sailed from Liverpool for the Mauritius, with two Priests, three divinity students, and eight Nuns of the Loretto convent, Dublin.

Judge Ball sent the Rev. Dr. Burke, P. P. Clonmel, £5 towards building a parochial poor school.

The Roman Catholics are about to erect a church, school, and priest's residence, in the neighbourhood of Burnley, at a cost of £6,000.

Three Sisters of Mercy, from the Convent in Baggott-street, Dublin, have arrived in Liverpool to take charge of an Orphan Poor School.

The Rev. R. Cussen, P. P. Bruff, gratefully announces that General Dickson, of Bagnin-house, Reading, has been pleased to grant a noble and beautiful site for a new Chapel on his property at Glenogra, in this county; the manner much enhancing the value of the gift.
