LORD CAREW.

A typical Irishman, and a resident landlord devoted to agriculture and sport, is Lord Carew, who on Wednesday completed his half-century. It is nearing thirty years since he succeeded his father as a third holder of an Irish dignity created in 1834, which was supplemented by a United Kingdom barony four years later. He represents a junior branch of the ancient house of Carew, which has its present chief in Sir Henry Palk Carew, ninth harquet. The family traces an uninterrupted descent, in the direct male line, from Anglo-Saxon times. Lord Carew is a pastoral peer and an authority on the breeding of shorthorns, having taken many prizes with his pedigree cattle.

IRISH POOR LAW ADMINISTRATION.

Owing to certain duties having been transferred under the Local Government Act, 1898, it is not possible, Mr. Birrell on Thursday informed Mr. Keating, to state with accuracy the amount raised locally in 1897 for Poor Law administration in Ireland as it now exists. Of the total expenditure of Boards of Guardians from revenue the approxinrate amount raised locally was £1,103,228 in 1897, and £817,751 in 1909. The amounts raised locally to meet the expenditure on roads, streets, and bridges are not ascertainable, but the sums so expended from revenue in 1897 and 1909 were respectively £1,050,435 and £1,079,736.
