

King's Bench, in the room of Mr. Justice Henn, resigned

On Wednesday last was decided in the court of Common Pleas, before the Rt. hon. Lord Carleton, a cause highly interesting to the interests of commercial credit.

It was an action brought by Mrs. McCormick, against a Mr. Keller, an attorney, for the amount of a bill of exchange for hundred and odd pounds, passed to the plaintiff by the defendant, and upon which his name was written as the last endorser.

It was represented on behalf of the plaintiff that she had held the note or bill of some person resident in the county of Galway for that term, that the defendant, who was the friend and attorney of the person whose bill she held, died on her some time before the bill became due; represented to her there was some unpleasant disappointment in the expected provision for that bill, but prevailed on her to accept exchange for it, the accepted bill of a tradesman in Thomas-street, which the defendant endorsed with his name, before which there appeared the names of several other endorsers. Before this bill became due the acceptor became insolvent. The payment was applied for but not obtained, and the bill being duly protested, application was made to the defendant, who refused payment, in consequence of which the present action was brought.

The defence urged by defendant's counsel was on a point of law, that the plaintiff had not applied to the drawer of the bill, nor the original endorser, which she was bound to do, and to shew their refusal or incapacity of payment, before she was warranted to commence the present action, and counsel therefore moved, that the plaintiff might be non-suited with costs.

Counsel for the plaintiff alleged, that both the drawer and original endorser of the bill lived in the county Galway, and that the plaintiff had sued the defendant as the only party within her reach, which she had a right to do at her option to any one of the parties concerned in collateral securities to the validity of the bill.

The court, however, was pleased to allow the objections of defendant's counsel, and the prayer of the court was ordered to call on the plaintiff to shew cause forthwith why a non-suit should not issue, when one of the jurors, Mr. Graham, of Castle-street, respectfully addressing the bench, asked leave to say, that himself and fellow-jurors, from the evidence that appeared in which they were sworn to decide, could not coincide by their verdict with any decision that was to non-suit the plaintiff in this case; his fellow-jurors and he had made up their minds to the clear evidence and justice of the claim. The defendant had not denied the debt, nor the transaction alleged on the part of the plaintiff; they could not therefore reconcile to their consciences, as honest men and traders, a decision which allowed a legal quibble to frustrate the fair and equitable claim of the plaintiff, sanctioned not only by its own justice, but by the usage of trade, throughout the British dominions. It was invariably understood the usage of the banks, which were the accumulators of paper currency, that the last order was held equally responsible with any other, and with the acceptor: nay,
