Before this bill became due the acceptor beme insolvent. The payment was applied for t not obtained, and the bill being duly proled, application was made to the defendant, ho refused payment, in confequence of which e present action was brought.

The defence urged by defendant's counsel as on a point of law, that the plaintiff had or applied to the drawer of the bill, nor the riginal endorser, which she was bound to do, not to shew their resultation incapacity of payment, before she was warranted to commence the present action, and counsel therefore moving that the plaintiff might be non-suited with

ofts.

Counsel for the plaintiff alledged, that both he drawer and original endorser of the bill lived in the county Galway, and that the plaintiff ad sued the desendant as the only party with her reach, which she had a right to do at er option to any one of the parties concerned so collateral securities to the validity of the ill.

The court, however, was pleased to allow ne objections of defendant's counfel, and the ryer of the court was ordered to call on the aintiff to shew cause forthwith why a nonful rould not iffue, when one of the jurors, Mr. ahan, of Castle-Street, respectfully addressing se bench, asked leave to say, that himself and llow-jurors, from the evidence that appeared which they were Iworn to decide, could not pincide by their verdict with any decision that as to non-luit the plaintiff in this cafe; his llow-jurors and he had made up their minds the clear evidence and justice of the claim.
