LIMERICK—FRIDAY, JUNE 26. 1812.

London Journals to the 21st inst. inclusive have been received. The intelligence they convey, though of some interest, are not very important: for particulars we refer to our extracts.

The House of Commons did not transact any business on Thursday: the speaker counted the house at four o'clock, and finding only 36 members present, adjourned until the following day. This excited considerable surprise, as Mr. Canning's motion was fixed for that day. One of the London papers, however, informs us, that the non-attendance of the members at the proper hour was prevented by a heavy shower of rain: and that shortly after the adjournment, 300 members had assembled. On Saturday, Mr. Canning postponed his motion till Monday—the following, we are informed, are the resolutions which he intended to propose:

Resolved, 1. that the house will early in the next session of Parliament, take into its consideration the state of the laws affecting his Majesty's Roman catholic subjects, in Great Britain and Ireland, with a view to such a final and conciliatory adjustment as may be conducive to the peace and strength of the United Kingdom, to the stability of the protestant establishment, and to the general satisfaction and concord of all classes of his Majesty's subjects.

2. That the foregoing resolution be laid before his Royal Highness the Prince Regent.

The reports of the French having raised the siege of Cadiz, &c are hitherto unconfirmed. The following is the latest intelligence from Spain, and we hope will be found correct:

WATERFORD, JUNE 23.—On Sunday last, the *Trio*, Captain Trivot, arrived in this harbour from Vienna, which place she left on the 11th of this month. On the morning of her departure, Lisbon Gazettes had arrived from Oporto, which contained accounts, that Lord Wellington had taken Salamanca, with all the provisions and stores which it contained, that the allied armies were advancing into Spain in two divisions, the one Northward, and the other Southward, and that Galicia had been entirely cleared of the enemy.

The London papers contain an address from the government to the Spanish Guerillas, exhorting them to facilitate desertion from the French armies by protecting and forwarding deserters to the out posts.

The exchequer bills which were issued to the merchants and others last year, for relief under the pressing embarrassments of trade, were to have been repaid in July and October next. We are now informed, that an extension of the time has been determined on, for the further convenience of the parties, until the month of February, May, and August, 1813.

On Monday evening, his Excellency Sir John Hope, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's forces in Ireland, arrived in Kilkenny, on his tour of inspection through the south eastern district, and the following day he inspected on the parade the troops composing that garrison.

The first division, consisting of three companies of the Monaghan regiment, march from Clonmel for Rathkeale, on this day. The second division, of two companies, on to-morrow for Newcastle, and the remaining three companies on Monday, for Askeaton, Abbeyfeale and Bruff. They will be replaced by the North Down regiment from Cashel, whose quarters will be occupied by the Cavan militia.

The City of Limerick militia arrived in Cavan on Thursday last, from Dublin, and are to be detached as follows:—Cavan, Kells, Belturbet, Virginia, Coot-hill, Clones and Ballyborough.

Last Wednesday, a dispute took place in the public house near the barracks of Cork, between a party of the Kerry militia, and a party of the Brunswick Oels cavalry, when one of the latter struck a man of the name of Sullivan, of the Kerry militia, several blows on the forehead, with a stick, of which he died the next day. An inquest was held on the body, which returned a verdict against the Brunswicker, who has been committed to Cork jail.
