### Youth Drowned.

He was with other boys wading at the time, and getting beyond his depth he was drowned before help could arrive. ## LIMERICK TRAGEDY.

### Man Shot Dead.

The dead body of a man, whose name is supposed to be Doherty, a Limerick ex-service man, was found lying near the old toll-house, Athlunkard Bridge, this morning by a resident of the locality who happened to be passing at the time. The deceased was a one-armed man, aged about thirty years, and stated to be unmarried. There were two bullet wounds in the body—one over the heart and another in the head. A label was attached to the clothing bearing the words—"Tried, convicted, and executed. I.R.A. Spies Beware." The remains were removed in the Corporation Fire Brigade ambulance to the military morgue, New Barracks.

## SEVEN O'CLOCK CURFEW.

### In Large City Area.

A Proclamation, which took effect last evening, was issued yesterday by Colonel Commandant Cameron, C.B., C.M.G., Military Governor of Limerick, stating:—"Every person residing in the area below mentioned in the County of Limerick shall remain indoors between the hours of 7 p.m and 3 a.m (summer time). And no one shall enter or leave the said area between these hours.

"Area—All that area lying within a line drawn from Thomond Bridge along the river up to and including Sarsfield Bridge, thence along Sarsfield street, William street, Upper William street and Mulgrave street to Blackboy Pike; thence along Limerick Junction road to Singland Railway Bridge; thence along the Railway line to the Shannon Railway Bridge; thence along the river Shannon to Thomond Bridge.

"And take notice that this Order is made because of recent attacks on Crown forces and civilians, made by rebels aided by certain members of the civil population.

"And take notice that this Order comes into force on Monday, 27th June, 1921, and will be rescinded on Monday, 11th July, 1921, always provided that no further outrages take place."

## THE WOUNDED IN HOSPITAL.

The two wounded men in Barrington's Hospital, David Carroll and Michael Mulqueen, are in much the same way as when admitted to the Institution. Mulqueen was admitted on Sunday night suffering from a bullet wound in the right leg. His wound is not serious. Carroll's condition is precarious, as the wound in the right leg is developing gangrene, and to save life the doctors are in favour of amputating the affected limb. To this course some of Carroll's relatives are, it is stated, opposed, and so the patient remains in a critical state.
