A CONCEALED TRENCH.

Accident to Police Convoy.

A convoy of police from Listowel ran into a trench on Sunday outside Newcastle West. Two constables were seriously injured, and District-Inspector Bygott and three other constables slightly, while the car in which they were travelling was badly damaged. The trench is said to have been concealed.

FATAL ENCOUNTER IN THE CITY.

Two of the crew of an American steamer in the docks quarrelled last evening. James Godley and James Dargan, men of colour. Godley was stabbed with a knife in the right groin, and bled profusely. He was removed to Barrington's Hospital, where he died late last night. Dargan was arrested and committed to prison.
