HUNDRED FATALITIES.

Crops Ruined by Drought.

New York, Wednesday.

The country was yesterday in the grip of the most acute heat wave of the year, the temperatures, according to official registrations, ranging high in the nineties, with a maximum of 104 degs, and the humidity was excessive. There were 26 fatalities in New York, 19 at Chicago, 15 at Pittsburg, 37 in New England, and 9 at Philadelphia, and scores of prostrations.

Everywhere the continued drought has greatly damaged all grain crops in the West. Oats are

reported to be virtually ruined.

Death from Heat in Montreal.

Montreal, Wednesday.

The death rate during the last two days due to excessive heat is unprecedented. There have been 183 deaths, the victims in 146 cases being children.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT IN THE CITY.

A very sad drowning accident occurred yester-day afternoon, the victim being a young man named George W. Reid, unmarried, and aged 30, son of Mr. James Reid, ex-Sergeant R.I.C., residing at Mount Vincent Cottages. It appears that he swam across the river from the public baths at the King's Island, and was returning when he was seen to go under the water midway in the stream. The onlookers took it he was diving but when he did not rise, some men swam to his rescue. It was some minutes before the body was recovered, when life was pronounced extinct. It is presumed that the young man was seized with a fit as he was an expert swimmer. Great sympathy is expressed with his parents and family in their keen spriow.

There was no inquest held by the city Coroner Mr. J. F. Barry, who did not deem an inquiry necessary in the circumscances of the sad accident.
