At the King's Bench, last week, Michael H. Connolly v. Richard Wilson, to recover from the indorser the amount of a Bill of Exchange, dated September, 1814, for £4, at sixty-one days, a verdict was had for plaintiff. In *Robinson v. Cowry*, to recover amount of a bill of costs, a verdict of £5 15s. was had for plaintiff.

At the Court of Sessions, Alexander Richardson, jun. was remanded, last week, to the Insolvent Court, and his petition dismissed, by the Commissioner Burrowes, for a debt of 95l. due to the late Talbot, Woollen Draper, of Dame-street. Wm. Richardson was likewise remanded for six months, at the instance of William Black.

Lord Lieutenant has had his thanks conveyed to the Earl of Enniskillen and the other Magistrates of Fermanagh, who evinced such promptitude in preventing a public procession on St. John's day.

The Orangemen of Mountmellick intend to celebrate the 24th with the usual demonstrations of joy. Orders have been issued to the Police over the whole of the County to prevent all party processions. The opinion of the Attorney and Solicitor General has been had by the Government that such processions are illegal. Orders have also been received by the Commanding Officers of the Militia, to prevent any of the individuals of their regiments from joining in any such processions.—*Dublin Evening*

Monday morning, the Mayor held an inquisition on the body of a newly born female infant, which was found the preceding day, floating in the river, near the Abbey, where it is supposed to have been thrown by its unnatural parent.

Last week, a woman happening to pass through a field near Bruff, in this County, in which a bull was kept, was gored to death by the animal; and what is remarkable, she was on her way to the Sessions there, to prosecute the owner of it for an assault.

An awful accident occurred to a woman of the name of Connell, on the road near Ahane, on Saturday. During the severe thunder-storm, she was struck to the ground with a portion of the electric fluid, the violent shock from which caused instantaneous death; the body was taken up much discolored by the effects of the lightning.

The late Mr. David Fennessy, who drowned himself, bequeathed 500l. to the Public Charities of Waterford. The will was made last January.

On Monday last, William Johnston, of the band of the 19th Regiment, saved from drowning a boy about twelve years' old, at Mead's Quay.

A meeting of Magistrates is to be held to-morrow, at Blarney, County Cork, to remove the Police from the district, which is now in a perfect state of tranquillity.

After the Visitation Sermon at Clonyne, the Lord Bishop gave an excellent charge, in which, among other things, he alluded to the malicious attacks which have been lately made on the Established Church generally, and pointed out with much force, the necessity of close attention on the part of the Clergy, to everything pertaining to their high and holy vocation, as the best means of vindicating the Establishment from the attacks of its enemies and confirming the attachment of its friends. His Lordship expressed much gratification in the marked improvement which had taken place in the diocese within the last year. The Clergy dined with his Lordship at the Palace.

The Bishop of Killaloe will hold his annual visitation at the Cathedral of Killaloe to-morrow.

A Special Vestry, under the Tithe Composition Act, was held in the Parish of Erry, Diocese of Cashel, on Tuesday, July 5th, when the Rev. Mr. J. M. Paul agreed to receive a fixed yearly sum as a Composition for the Tithes payable to him as Rector of the Parish.

In the Gazette of the 7th instant there are no less than sixteen orders of the Lord Lieutenant to proceed in different parishes, under the Tithe Act of the 4th Geo. IV. to assemble a Special Vestry to carry said Act into execution.

The Crown is about to purchase the valuable Bishoprick of Sudor and Man, together with the whole of the ecclesiastical patronage belonging to the Athol family.

The Government have paid the purchase money of that part of Scatterry Island on which the works of defence have been lately erected, to the Corporation of Limerick, they having the fee of the Island.

The Chief Baron and Lord Norbury arrived in Carlow on Monday, when the Grand Jury was sworn in. The business is very inconsiderable, and supposed to end yesterday; there were only fourteen criminal cases and three records.

The nisi prius case Galway v. O'Brien, is for trial at the ensuing City Limerick Assizes.
