Assizes terminated on Tuesday, and exhibited a scene of horrid barbarity, perhaps unexampled.—An, an unnatural wretch, was convicted of the murder of an illegitimate child, which, it appeared in the trial, he threw to a pig, by whom it was devoured! The Assize was convicted of sheep-stealing. There is a Record case, Lessee Ball and wife v. Bradburn, an ejectment on the title to part of the land at Knockree—Verdict for Plaintiffs.

Assizes commenced on Thursday—the Hon. Mr. Justice M. P. is Foreman of the Grand Jury. The Lord Chancellor opened the Roscommon Assizes, on Thursday, and swore in the Grand Jury.—General Sessions, Foreman.

At the Quarter Sessions, on Thursday, a Chief Constable of Police in the Antrim district, was convicted of striking with his drawn sword a man at Randalstown, for leading a riot, and sentenced to pay a fine of £10, and his conduct represented to Government.

At the Quarter Sessions, last week, William Morrow, a yeoman, and John Holland and George M'Inchiquin, Constables, were convicted of an assault on a man, at Poyntpaz.—The first was fined five pounds, and the others a mark each, to pay prosecutor 4s. and bail.

At the Quarter Sessions, on Wednesday, James Magrath, Roger Magrath and his two sons, J. Hayden, and Wm. Ryan, were convicted of assaults, and Wm. Ryan of larceny. Colonel Bagwell, M. P. and the Rev. Mr. Cavendish presided with other Magistrates.

At the Quarter Sessions, on Wednesday, James Magrath, an apprentice of the 58th Regiment, having denied his apprenticeship to the Magistrate. He was sentenced to two years imprisonment.

At the Quarter Sessions, an action was brought, last week, by John Elhuich, v. Nicholls, for injury sustained by negligence in steering a ship, and a verdict of £6 2s. was given.

The inhabitants of Ballincollig have presented an petition to Charles Wilks, Esq. a Magistrate of that County, on his departure from the Country.

In the Roscrea investigation on Friday, Mr. Stephen Magrath, Sergeant W. Ashton 4th Dragoon Guards, Captain Waller 62d Regiment, and Mr. T. Hamilton, examined—and on Friday John Brophy, Thomas Magrath, Esq. and Mr. Alexander Frank, gave evidence on the subject of investigation.

A Protestant congregation of Ballyjamesduff, Cavan, was thrown into the greatest alarm by a large stone, which was flung in the Church door, in the midst of the congregation on Sunday. The assailant was seized by some of the congregation, but he was liberated by the crowd which had assembled.

Prohibitions have been withdrawn from several Public Houses in Belfast, on account of their entertaining Orange Meetings on the 12th instant.

The Annual Meeting of the Irish Evangelical Society will be held at the County of Wick, on Friday.

An Inquest was held in the County Infirmary, on Sunday, on the body of Patrick Slattery, who died the night previous. It appeared in evidence that he was attacked on Monday, the 11th inst. at a pattern held at Kildimo, by James Danaher and James Dundon, of Cragbeg, with some others, who gave him a severe blow of a stone on the head, which was the cause of his death. The usual verdict was then returned against the above persons.

About four o'clock in the afternoon of Sunday, a stable in William-Street was observed to be on fire; and serious fears were naturally entertained for the safety of the houses and numerous offices immediately adjoining. But the Artillery, under Colonel Worsley and Major St. Clair, arriving with incredible celerity, dispelled the alarm; and having applied their engine with powerful effect to the flames, they were, in a short time, entirely extinguished, without occasioning much injury. The Atlas engine was also on the ground, and their united exertions preserved the adjoining premises. The stable was completely destroyed with a few tons of hay, but the origin of the fire has not been correctly ascertained. Aldermen Watson, the City Police, and a large party of the 19th Foot, with a number of fatigue men, were in attendance to render every assistance.

At Carlow Races, last week, Timothy Nowlan, a farmer from the Queen's County, was run through the body by the shaft of a Jaunting-car, and killed on the spot.

Two of the Wellesley Bridge lighters, sank yesterday, at their moorings, from being overloaded.

Thomas Rogers, a master tailor, in Waterford, attempted to commit suicide on Sunday, by cutting his throat with a razor. The wound, altho' of great extent, was sewed up, and is not expected to prove mortal.

Two privates of the 58th Regiment, John Mulligan, and Daniel Game, fought a duel with their muskets at Dungarvan on Saturday, at 16 paces distant, and in the second fire the former was shot through the neck and fell dead. The offender will be tried at Waterford Assizes.

The order for the 58th Regiment to march from Waterford for this City, has been countermanded.

The 19th Regiment, in this City, expect a route every day.

The 39th Regiment arrived yesterday in Cork Barrack from Buttevant.
