

signs if they had power. He adverted to the boldness and presumption of their application to the Regent to dismiss no less a personage than the chief governor of this kingdom and his secretary, because they did not let them act as they pleased. He admitted, however, the undoubted right of the catholics to petition the throne, a right which they were indebted for to that great Prince, King William, who, by the bill of rights, had given the power of petitioning to all classes of the subjects of these realms; and the memory of this very Prince, from whom they derive this right, is the object of their hatred and abhorrence.

Mr. Hutton expressed his disapprobation of the motion; he said, after the manner in which Mr. Pole had treated the catholic body in a letter, which was declared both illegal and unconstitutional, it could not be a matter of surprize, that they had applied for his removal.

The resolution being sent up to the Board of Aldermen for their concurrence, they refused it, and threw out the resolution. In consequence it fell to the ground.

CLONMEL, JULY 16.—The following occurrence, we are informed, took place on Friday night last, at Modeligo, near Cappoquin.—About twelve or one o'clock that night, a man of the name of Power, in company with another person, (supposed to be a leader of one of those deluded factions which disturb the public peace,) took a horse out of a field, for the purpose of speedily conveying away the leader, and, on being pursued by the owner of the horse and a friend of his Power fired two shots, upon which the pursuers being unarmed, and alarmed a Mr. Rogers, their neighbour, who with another friend, took a different way, and intercepted Power on his return. On being challenged by Mr. Rogers, Power fired a pistol, the ball from which passed close by Mr. Rogers, who immediately returned the fire and shot Power dead. The body was conveyed next morning to Cappoquin, where an inquest was held on it.—the verdict was—*Justifiable Homicide.*
