There was not a single record for trial at Ennis, one Distringas in the hands of the Sheriff was settled.
On Monday, the Queen's County Assizes commenced at Maryborough, before Lord Norbury. Sir Henry Parnell was Foreman of the Grand Jury. The only case of importance was that of a charge of murder brought against James White, Esq. a Magistrate, and lately High Sheriff of the County. It was satisfactorily proved on the evidence of four Physicians, that the unfortunate gentleman was non compos mentis.. The Jury therefore returned a verdict of lunacy, and the trial was not proceeded with. His Lordship gave his warrant for detaining the prisoner in goal, until the pleasure of the Lord Lieutenant as to his future disposal shall be made known. William Phanton and Denis and James Bowse, were tried for the murder of Peter Keating, at Mountrath, on the 17th of March. The Jury not agreeing were discharged in the evening, but the prisoners continue in custody. Michael Keating, for highway robbery, Patrick Flannigan, for cow-stealing, James Ryan, for coining, and a man of the name of Hanly, for sheep-stealing, were severally convicted. There was but one Record tried before the Chief Baron, Loveland v. Barrington, an ejectment for non-payment of rent—verdict for Plaintiff 848l. 15s. 2d.

The Wexford Assizes commenced on Tuesday, before the Right Hon. the Lord Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Johnson—Lord Viscount Stopford, M. P. is Foreman of the Grand Jury.

Major Carter, Chief of the County Cork Police, arrived in Bristol, on Tuesday, on his way to London—it is supposed he is charged with a mission to apprehend some persons charged with murder in the County Cork, who are lurking about the English metropolis.

At seven o'clock, on Thursday morning, the Mayor held an inquest on the body of John Tuomy, who died in the Infirmary the preceding day, in consequence of wounds received from several persons on the 22d ult., at the fair of Croom—verdict accordingly. One of the alleged perpetrators is lodged in jail

On Wednesday evening, John Kelly, a smith, in humanely attempting to rescue a boy from drowning, near the Lock Mills, unfortunately sunk to rise no more—his body was found a few moments after a lifeless corpse—an inquest was held, yesterday, on the remains, by the Mayor. Kelly was the chief support of a helpless family.

Yesterday, a girl, named O'Shaughnessy, was scalded to death, by falling into a vat of burned beer. The Mayor held an inquest on the body this day.

On Tuesday, whilst the Coach from Cork, by Fermoy, to this City, was driving through the streets of Kilmallock, a man, named Michael Keefe, in the most wanton manner, furiously struck the leading horses, and afterwards threw stones at the Carriage which hit one of the passengers—the Mayor of Limerick being in the Coach, had the perpetrator apprehended, who was immediately sent forward under an escort of Chief Constable Jackson's Police, to the County Jail. The conduct of the driver, Smith, was most correct, and to his steadiness is to be attributed that the Coach was not upset,

An infamous outrage was committed in Cork, on Wednesday morning, between one and two o'clock:—The Offices of Messrs. James and George R. Pain, Architects, and the Dwelling-house of George R. Pain, Camden Place, together with the Dwelling of one of their Foremen, were assailed by a set of men, supposed to belong to the Union of Trades, who broke in the Sashes, destroyed the Glass, and attempted to force an entrance into the Foreman's House, for the supposed purpose of murdering him. The Messrs. Pain have offered 50 Guineas reward for the perpetrators, and the inhabitants of that very extensive City were convened, yesterday, by the following notice:—"The Mayor, Sheriff, and Magistrates of Cork, having received information that a considerable number of Tradesmen have engaged in a System of Illegal Combination, request a Meeting, at the City Court-House, on Friday, the 22d instant, at One o'clock, of such of their Fellow Citizens as are disposed to discountenance a proceeding so much calculated
