The other children of Earl Grosvenoc, who had been vaccinated, were, in consequence of this alarm, subjected to various innoculation, and were found to have been secured from its effects by the previous vaccination.

A marked instance of the appearance of small-pox, twice in the same person, has occurred twice in the case of the Rev. Mr. Rowley, son of Lady Rowley .--About forty years ago, Mr. Rowley, then a child, was insculated for the small pox, by Mr. Adair, surgeongeneral; and had a considerable erruption. On the 5th of June last he was seized with lever; and eruption appeared on the third day; there were two hundred postules on the face, and the distemper has proved a severe case of distinct small-pox.

Another instance of small-pox after inoculation has happened to Miss S. Booth, of Covent Garden Theatre. At five years of age this young lady was inoculated for small pox. The progress of the arm was regular, she had considerable fever, and the whole of the appearances were of a nature to afford, it was believed, a perfect security from any future attack of the disease. On the 20th of Jame she was seized with febrile symptome, which proved the precursor of small pox? on Sunday, the third day from the attack, postules appeared on the forehead and scalp. The emption spread to other parts of the frame, accompanied with a sore throat. This cruption passed through the usual forms and stages of the disease, and constituted an

By the Lord Lieutecant and Council of Ireland, A PROCLAMATION-RICHMOND, &c.

HEREAS the time limited by our proclamation of the 23d day of January last, for prohib trok the exportation out of Ireland or carrying coastwise ganpowder or sall petre, or any sort of arms or aminunition has expired : And whereas it is judged expedient. that the said prob bition should be renewed and contiused for some time longer: Now we the Lord Lieutenont General and General Governor of Ireland, by and with the advice of his Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever, (except the master general of the ordunnee for his Majesty's service,) do at any time for the space of six mouths from the date hereof, pre+ some to transport into any part out of Ireland or carry coastwise any guapawder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, or ship or lade on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, or carrying the same coastwise, without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governers & Prisy Council of Ireland, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and pepalties inflicted by an act passed in Great Britain in the 29th year of his late Majesty's reign, entitled, " An act to empower his Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering his Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ainmonition; and also to empower his Majesty to restrain the carrying constwise of saitpetre, goupowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition." And the commissioners of his Majesty's customs are to give the necessary orders herein as to them may respectively appertain. Given at the council chamber in Dublin, the 24th day of July 1811. #### A PROCLAMATION.

RICHHOND, &c.

BEREAS the time limited by our proclamation of the twenty-third day of January last, prohibiting the transporting into any parts out of Ireland of any pig-iron, bar-iron, hemp, pitth, tur, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowspeils, ours, oakum, sheet copper, or other navalstores, has expired :

And whereas it is judged expedient that the said prohibition should be renewed and continued for some time

Now we the Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland, by and with the advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, do bereby order, require, probibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever do at any time for the space of aix months from the date hereof, presume to transport into any parie out of Ireland any pig iron, bar-iron, hemp -pitch, tarrosin, turpentine, anchoro, cables, cordage, masts, yards, howsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, sail cloth or canvas, or other naval stores; or do ship or lade any pigiron, bar-iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, see chors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, howsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, sail cloth, or canvas, or other naval stores, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any part beyond the scass, without leave or permission first being had of obtained from the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor oc Governors and Privy Council of Ireland, upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by an act passed in Great Britain in the 33d year of his Majesty's reign. entitled, " An act to enable his Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more remaint.
