He remained there in such a state of wretchedness, that his beard grew to a most immoderate length, and rendered him a most striking picture of the vicissitudes of human life. According to the arrangements made by his Lordship, the debt would have been paid in the course of two years more.

London, they for a short time, committed the most dreadful ravages; but four or five regiments at length suppressed them, and several of the ring-leaders were apprehended.— But it should be considered they did not meet together in support of liberty and the constitution, nor were they stimulated to the same by scarcity and distress, but met with a villainous design to plunder and destroy, and yet with all their atrocity and violence, were stopped from robbing the Bank of England by the terror of a few field pieces. In Madrid the populace who are not above a fourth so numerous as in the capital of the sister kingdom, compelled the Sovereign to part with his favourite Italian Minister, and abolish the edicts that altered some of the ancient customs of the Spaniards. In Paris the people seem worked up to the highest pitch of determined opposition, nor is a large army, with a train of artillery, able to intimidate them from their purpose. Their efforts are, however, actuated by a noble and just motive, though probably they have gone by much too far, and the consequences are dreadful to reflect on.

We hear from Turlow, that on the 16th inst. two brothers named Hurly, (victuallers,) both intoxicated it may be supposed, one armed with a cleaver, and the other with a knife, sallied into the street, menacing destruction to all who came in their way; when two women, (a Mrs. Hopkins and a Mrs. Chambers) endeavouring to appease them met the threatened fate, one of them being killed on the spot, and the other so desperately wounded, that her life is despaired of. We are sorry to add, that the assassins have as yet escaped the hands of justice.
