In our last we expressed an apprehension for the fate  
of Mr. Henry Wilson, Mate of the Brig William.—  
On Thursday evening, as some boys were playing on the  
new dock works of the Wellesley Bridge, one of them flung  
a small stone into the water, and thought that he hit some-  
thing like a dog, or pig, supposed to be drowned. A man  
went to the Police barracks, and a boat was procured, when  
they succeeded in raising the body of a man who proved to  
be the deceased Wilson. They had him removed to the  
Police station, where the Mayor held an inquest on the body.  
The persons examined were—Mr. Gleeson, of Honan's-quay,  
a Policeman and his assistant. Gleeson deposed, that Wilson  
had been drinking at his sister's house on Friday evening,  
the 25th ult. the night of his disappearance; that they did  
all in their power to prevail on him take a bed there, but to  
no effect; on finding him resolved to go away, they sent the  
errand boy after him to see what direction he had taken.—  
The boy soon returned to say that Wilson had got into the  
society of a female; on learning which he (witness) went  
out and came up to him near Roche's-street, where he again  
used every entreaty to prevail on him either to go back to  
his sister's house, or that he would accompany him, Wilson  
to his ship; Wilson declined both offers, and went on. It  
was then about eleven o'clock at night—the deceased drank  
nothing but ale during the time he had been at his sister's  
house, and he had his watch and money when leaving the  
house. Thomas Lewis, the Policeman, stated, that on find-  
ing the deceased he searched his pockets and found his  
watch, 1s. 6d. in silver, and 3d. in coppers, upon his per-  
son, as also a permit. There were no marks of violence  
whatever upon the deceased, save a cut on the back of the  
head, caused most likely by the stone thrown by the boy.—  
Verdict: “ Found drowned.” Wilson was a fine able young  
man, about 5 feet 8 inches in height, sandy hair, and fair  
complexion.
