**DEATH OF EARL DUNRAVEN.**

With deep and unaffected concern we announce the death of this inestimable Peer, which melancholy event occurred yesterday morning at eight o'clock, at his seat, Adare Manor, in this county, surrounded in his last moments by his afflicted and attached family. His Lordship was a constant resident, and gave continued and extensive employment ; he had nearly completed one of the most princely mansions in this country. Beloved as he was by a respectable and intelligent tenantry, his demise will be severely felt, and by an affectionate family his loss is irreparable. He discharged all the duties of life in a manner worthy of imitation—he was an attached husband, a loving parent, a sincere friend, a kind landlord and neighbour. He died rejoicing in the LORD, and in full assurance of a blessed resurrection thro' the blood of CHRIST.

His Lordship was born 24th Sept. 1782 ; married December 27th, 1810, Caroline, sole heiress of the late Thomas Wyndham, Esq, of Dunraven Castle, County Glanmorgan, a most amiable lady by whom he has issue Viscount Adare, M.P. The Hon. Windham Henry Quin, Cornet 13th Light Dragoons and Lady Anna Maria, married to William Monsell, Esq. M.P. County Limerick. The lamented Earl was an Irish representative Peer and custos rotulorum for the County of Limerick, which he formerly represented for many years in the House of Commons.—

His Lordship had the benefit of the first medical advice that could be procured, and in addition to former professional assistance from Dublin, a medical gentleman of the first ability from that metropolis arrived by the half-past three o'clock train on Monday, when, in consultation with his previous physicians, it was agreed upon that the operation of Trachiotomy could alone afford any prospect of giving even temporary relief. Doctor Gelston, a practitioner of eminence was immediately summoned from Limerick, by Dr. Worrall, his Lordship's domestic physician, who arrived at nine o'clock, p.m., at Adare Manor, and proceeded at once to the operation, which was skilfully executed, and affording instantaneous alleviation from difficulty of breathing, his Lordship's most urgently distressing symptom. However, the relief was only temporary, as his Lordship's dissolution took place the following morning at eight o'clock.

The present Earl is married to Augusta, third daughter of Thomas Gould, Esq., deceased, Master in Chancery, and has issue Lady Caroline, born 15th May, 1838, Lord Adare born 12th Feb. 1841, and four other children. The Earl is M.P. for Glanmorganshire. The Earl Dunraven is daily expected at Adare Manor. His Lordship is at present on the Continent with his Countess, who is in a bad state of health.
