His grandmother was one of the sisters of the famous admiral, and he was born in 1823, and succeeded his father in 1835. He has sat in the House of Lords for sixty-six years, and although he is not the oldest member of the Chamber, the Earl of Wemyss, Lord Strathearn, and the Duke of Grafton being his seniors, he has been a member of the House for a longer time than any of them.
