### General Quarterly Meeting.

Apologies were received from Mrs. R. Nash, Miss Orpen, and Mrs. Jas. Doyle, V.P.

A letter from Mrs. J. Spillane was read thanking the Committee for their vote of condolence passed by them in her recent sorrow.

The minutes of the annual general meeting of March 19th were read and signed.

Estimates were read for a glass case for the display of lace to be exhibited at the Railway Terminus, and which was granted by the Countess of Dunraven, President. Mrs. Geary, V.P., Miss Doyle, and Mr. Close, were appointed by the Committee to look after the matter.

Report of work since the general meeting was as follows:—The Women's Branch decided to resume their free concerts in the month of September, also in conjunction with the Men's Branch of the Industrial Association to do something to make Limerick more attractive to tourists through the summer season. Mr. Close, Hon. Sec. Men's Branch, said he was in communication with other branches of the Irish Industrial Development Association throughout Ireland about the visit of American tourists. Sub-Committees were appointed to visit public institutions in order to further Irish manufacture, and it was decided to send a deputation from both branches to inspect the Sixmilebridge Woollen Factory.

The Vice-Chairman asked if all present were dressed in Irish manufacture? She was answered in the affirmative, and urged all present to continue true to the objects of the Association.

A vote of thanks was proposed by Mrs. R. P. O'Connor, and seconded by the meeting, to the Hon. Mary Spring Rice for all the good work she was doing for Ireland in Feynes.

Another vote of thanks was proposed from the chair, and passed, to the Men's Branch for their lectures throughout the country.

A vote of sympathy was unanimously passed to Mr. Riordan, Hon. Sec. Cork Development Association on his recent illness with the hopes of all present for his speedy recovery.

On the motion of the Chair, Mrs. Geary proposed and Mrs. R. P. O'Connor seconded the election of the Hon. Mrs. Baring and Miss White, Nantenan, as Vice-Presidents of the Women's Branch Limerick Industrial Association. This was unanimously passed.

The meeting signified a unanimous wish to hold their meetings, etc., at their offices, 19, O'Connell Street, during the absence of their President. The next monthly meeting was fixed to be held on the first week of September. It was decided to secure a window in Limerick for the display of local and Irish manufacture to be run by the Women's Branch conjointly with the Men's Branch of the Limerick Industrial Association.
