ment, at the last Assizes, for a burglary committed prior to his enlistment in that corps.

On Monday, Patrick Walsh was tried at Clonmel Assizes for the atrocious murder and burning of the Sheas, at Tubber, in the County of Tipperary, on the night of the 19th of November, 1821. This important case excited a strong and general feeling of anxiety; the Court House was crowded, and at 6 o'clock in the evening the Jury retired for deliberation. There appearing no probability of an agreement, the Court adjourned to next day, the Jury remained in all night, and at 10 o'clock yesterday morning when the latest accounts left, they had not then found a verdict, and preparations were being made for kishing the pannel to the bounds of the County. Last Spring Assizes, Patrick Gorman was found guilty and executed for this horrible outrage.

At Clonmel, last week, several burning petitions were presented, wherein it appeared the sufferers made no effort though called on by the Police to pursue the wicked perpetrators of those outrages on property. The Judge observed, that when such was proved to be the case, the Grand Jury were authorised to dismiss the petition for compensation.

The trial of prisoners for the riot on the twelfth of July in Tipperary, came on. The Solicitor-General spoke to evidence very ably. The soldiers of the 34th Regiment do not appear implicated in having provoked that affair, nor their officers in having permitted them. Ten prisoners were arraigned, and all were convicted but one—William Ryan.

The Treasurer's Office, County Court-house, Clonmel, was broken into on Thursday night, and robbed of upwards of £40 in cash.

Yesterday, a child, of eighteen months, son of John M'Donald, cloth merchant, Rathkeale, was shot dead, by a boy incautiously handling a loaded pistol.

The fair of Spancel-Hill, yesterday, was well supplied with stock, but there was very little active business. The number of horses disposed of was limited; there was, however, some demand for carriage matches. A bay colt brought fifty guineas; indeed sellers looked for good prices, although purchasers were few. The cattle fair was rather heavy. Lambs sold in lots at 9s. each.

The meeting for yesterday, at Swinburne's, by the friends for christianizing the Jews, did not take place, in consequence of the non-arrival of the deputation. It is said that one of them, the Rev. Mr. Alexander, is indisposed at Cork.
