The Earl of Kerry, son of the Marquis of Lansdowne, and his Countess, landed at Dunmore East on Monday, from the Milford packet. Her Ladyship is daughter of Viscount Duncannon.

Sunday night last, Lord and Lady Glengall arrived at Caher House from England, and were received with lively demonstrations of joy.

Timothy Kinsella underwent the awful sentence of the law on Saturday in front of Maryboro' gaol, for the attempt to assassinate Mr. John Anderson. He confessed his guilt.

There was desperate fighting on Sunday last in the streets of Fethard; one man had a piece of his cheek taken off by a blow of a reaping-hook.

There was a bloody affray in the neighbourhood of Duncarvan, on Friday night. Mr. Dower, the brewer, purchased some time since from Mr. Paul Gee, the house and lands of Lisarow, of which he got possession—but, at the request of Mrs. Gee, allowed her to return to the house for a short period; Mr. Dower was recently married, and wishing to bring his wife to Lisarow, directed the house to be furnished for their reception, but his domestics were refused admission by Mrs. Gee. Mr. Dower sent some domestics to take forcible possession. Mr. D.'s ten men succeeded in enforcing an entrance into the house, Mrs. Gee being absent therefrom, but they were assailed in turn soon after by about forty persons, and received such tremendous punishment, that some are not expected to recover, whilst others escaped "with life but loss of limbs."

Mary Fitzgerald was this day fined by the Magistrates at Petty Sessions, in the mitigated penalty of £5, for having bought part of the military dress of a private, 91st Regt. Maurice Molony and two others v. Godfrey Hodge and Wm. Corneil, two of the City Police, stationed at Ballysimon. Molony charged the policemen with having gone to his house
