John Walsh, for the burning and murder, ended at Clonmel, on Wednesday, the Jury at the bounds of the County, for 48 hours, unable to agree in a verdict, was merely a repetition of what was said at the trial, and conviction of William Kelly. The principal witness for the prosecution was the prisoner going and retiring from the prison, who swore that the prisoner was one of the party, that, subsequent to making this identifying the prisoner three or four times, she totally lost her eye sight, yet her name, and Serjeant-Major Lowry, of the name, proved that she had identified the prisoner in Dublin. For the defence, the witness was examined to shew the witness had perfect sight, bore a bad character, and was kept at a distance on the night of the murder. These were the facts which the Jury, and rendered their verdict a task.

DEATH OF GRACE, AT RATHCANNON, IN THE PRESENCE OF MR. CHADWICK.

Grace was executed on Friday, for the barbarous murder of Chadwick, Esq. was on Monday, at five o'clock in the morning, led from her cell on a common car, for the place for which she was encircled by a number of the men of the 58th regiment, in front was a platform on which Grace was to be executed, as the hangman, surrounded by a party of men, a procession was met on the road by numerous gentlemen on horseback. The attention was not, however, diverted from the execution by the clergyman, (the Rev. Edward Brennan) who was accompanied.

As the procession entered Cashel, where the execution was to take place, a company of the Scots' Greys, detached from the 5th of the entire party was increased by the Cashel Police. In the bride-bread, wine and water, given him by the executioner, the procession moved from the road from that to Rathcannon, where the execution was to take place.

A halt for about five minutes was made, and who was near Grace said "there is the spot."—Grace heard him, but anxiously as if desirous his devotions should not be interrupted. When the party had arrived at the place, and while the platform was preparing, he embraced his brothers, and after embracing them, he went to entertain malice on his account to pray with the Clergyman, he ascended the scaffold, the rope having been fastened round his neck, and the assembled multitude in a loud voice, exhorted the people to avoid bad company, bad advice, and every vice and crime, which were the fruits of God, or man.
