A new bridge over the Feale, at Listowel, is advanced to completion, under the superintendence of Mr. G. G. G. the resident engineer. The work is executed in granite, the arches light and spacious. It has been necessary to support the old bridge with strong timber. The Bluncard Bridge is proceeding with celerity: the piers are already up. The Cork distillers, it appears, are driving their business to Dublin out of their own market. It has been decided by the Commissioners of the Customs to allow sugars in bond to be stored in the owners' own stores, on giving the necessary securities. The Yacht Club will meet at Foyne's Island on Friday next, the 8th instant precisely at 9 o'clock, and will sail from that to the Castle of Carrigaholt. Messrs Herrmann (four brothers) of Munich, are giving a grand concert in Cork on Thursday, and Mr. G. G. G. pianist to the King of Wirtemberg, another in Dublin on Wednesday. Mr. G. G. G., Inspector of Fisheries, enforced a conviction on Friday last, at Petty Sessions, held near Castlebar, for a breach of the Game Laws—penalty, £20. The Hon. Lord Massy and the Rev. J.
