LONDONDERRY MEETING—The catholic meeting of the county Londonderry was very numerous and highly respectable. The greatest order and decorum was observed throughout, and an excellent spirit and firmness evinced, highly honourable to every class in that distinguished county.

O'Doherty, James M'Elrevy, John M'Sheffry & John O'Doherty, of Londonderry; Thomas White, of the Waterside; W. O'Sheil, of Magilligan; Alex. Begley and Lewis Drummond, of Coleraine.

A great number of the Roman catholic inhabitants of the county Monaghan, having expressed a desire to present a petition to Parliament during the ensuing session for a repeal of the penal law, now particularly affecting their body, a meeting will be held in Ballibay, this day, the 3d of September, for the purpose of considering in what manner such should be prepared and forwarded.

The catholics of the county Louth will meet in a few days—the counties of Armagh, Fermanagh, and Wexford, meet on Monday next.

ARREST OF THE CATHOLIC DELEGATES.

With the possibility of being in error, we can state some circumstances upon this very important transaction, that tend almost to decide opinion, as the legality of the measures recently pursued, to interrupt the assemblage, or discussion of the Roman Catholics of Ireland, when either have for their object, the nomination of deputies or delegates, whichever they may be termed, to represent the catholic body at large, in the furtherance of their claims to the legislature, for a repeal of those civil and political disqualifications which affect them. What we state, we do with very profound respect for the names we introduce, whether we represent their opinions accurately or erroneously. We understand and although we speak with some reservation, we are assured that we are rightly informed, that Mr. Butler, the celebrated Conveyancer of Lincoln's Inn, has given a peremptory opinion against the legality of the arrests that have lately taken place in this country under the convention act, and it is added that Sir Sam. Romilly, than whom there is not a more eminent law authority, concurs fully in the opinion of Mr. Butler.

We are also informed that Baron Smith and Judges Fox & Fletcher view the matter as the English lawyers do, and differ from the Lord Chief Justice upon the legal interpretation of the convention act. The catholic gentlemen who had been arrested it is mentioned to us, have taken proceedings against the Chief Justice, and intend bringing into a court of law what they consider a violation of their liberty in the arrest of their persons under his Lordship's warrant.—These are not unimportant rumours even giving them that shape which is most doubtful.—*Cork Intelligencer.*
