**PHENIX PARK MURDERS RECALLED.**

**Death of Fitzharris.**

Dublin, Wednesday.

The terrible tragedy in the Phoenix Park on the  
 afternoon of the 6th May, 1882, when Lord  
 Frederick Cavendish and Mr. Bourke, the Under-  
 Secretary for Ireland, were assassinated by the  
 Invincibles is recalled by the death in the South  
 Dublin workhouse infirmary of James Fitzharris,  
 better known by the soubriquet "Skin the  
 Goat."

Fitzharris was the driver of the cab which came  
 second of the two vehicles containing Carey and  
 his accomplices, the driver of the first car being a  
 man named Kavanagh. It took close on twelve  
 months to unravel the conspiracy, the present  
 Judge Adye Curran conducting the investigation  
 with closed doors in Dublin Castle. At length  
 James Carey, the leader of the conspiracy, and  
 Kavanagh, the driver of the car, turned Queen's  
 evidence, and the trial of the participators in the  
 terrible crime were tried in Green street Court-  
 house by the late Mr. Justice, William O'Brien.  
 The trial resulted in the sentence to death of the  
 following—Joe Brady, Tim Kelly, Dan Curley,  
 Mike Fagan, and Caffry. Joe Mullet and  
 Fitzharris were sentenced to penal servitude for  
 life. Mullet and Fitzharris were released after  
 serving twenty years. Mullet died a few years  
 ago, and with the death of Fitzharris this morning  
 all those who took any part in the assassinations  
 have passed away, with the possible exception of  
 Kavanagh, who has not been heard of in Dublin  
 since the close of the trials. On his release  
 Fitzharris got some employment under the  
 Corporation, but for the past year or two he has  
 been in failing health, and has spent most of his  
 time in the South Union Workhouse Infirmary.  
 He was 84 years of age.

**FATAL ASSAULT AT  
 TEMPLEGLANTINE.**

John Sexton, a farmer residing at Rathcahill  
 West, Templeglantine, was assaulted on Sunday  
 night and rendered unconscious as the result of  
 a beating. When Sexton was discovered he  
 was found to be insensible, and he continued in  
 this condition until death took place yesterday  
 morning. Sexton was a man of middle life,  
 aged about 50, and the constabulary are unaware  
 of any motive to account for the occurrence which  
 has led to his death. They are investigating the  
 circumstances of the occurrence, but have not up  
 to the present succeeded in making any arrest.
