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fully at Liverpool en route to Dublin, on Friday, in Bellini's Grand Opera—*La Sonnambula*. Madame Grisi was encored in the finale to the opera, and afterwards called for. When she appeared she was greeted with the most rapturous applause, and bouquets were thrown at her feet upon the stage.  
Mr. Otway, Poor Law Commissioner, held a public meeting at Donegal, on Tuesday, where the Unions of Donegal, Boylagh, and Banagh were announced.  
Monday the labourers employed at Celbridge union workhouse turned out for an advance of wages, which Mr. Regan, the contractor, refused, stating that he had for the last fourteen months given them constant employment at 8s. per week, even during the depth of winter, and if they did not return to their work he would send to Dublin for labourers, which the former refused to do unless they got 9s. a week; so he was obliged to put his threat into execution.  
Ballinrobe workhouse is the only one as yet commenced in the county Mayo. This house will be finished at December, as it is now about to be roofed.  
Mr. Martin A. Brennan, of Dublin, law student, is giving lectures in Galway, against the Corn laws.  
Professor Davy is lecturing on Experimental Chemistry at the Museum, Kilkenny.  
The foundation of the new Bridewell and Court-house to be erected at Buncrana, will be laid to-morrow, by William Kerr M'Clintock, Esq.  
The Caledonian Company has paid Messrs. Alexander, of Derry, £1000, on the fire of their premises.  
Mary Moody, aged 19, is committed by the Magistrates of Belfast, for poisoning her uncle, Alexander Boyle, with a dose of arsenic.  
Lord Viscount Courtenay has sent a present of books to the Newcastle Temperance library, likewise a donation to the Temperance fund.  
Lady Dover has expended in one year £11,000 in improvements on the Gowran estate, Kilkenny.  
The only nobleman in Ireland who has attached himself to the Repeal agitation, is Lord Ffrench, a Roman Catholic.  
Mr. and Mrs. Balfé gave a concert at Tuam yesterday, and Mr. Seymour takes a benefit at Galway theatre on Friday.  
Much dissatisfaction exists in Caheriveen at the want of all arrangements to carry out the Poor law in that union. The same delay occurs in Kenmare and Killarney, where unions are declared, but no operations commenced.  
At Maryboro' Petty Sessions, on the 1st instant, the 1st conviction under the new Vaccination Act, took place, when nine persons were condemned in costs, for inoculating with small pox matter.  
The first sample of new oats at Tralee market sold for 1s. the stone.  
Friday last, the bakehouse of Mr. James Huggard, Tralee, was destroyed by fire, through the negligence of a workman. The 7th Fusiliers and Police rendered assistance, but the town continues nightly exposed to fire, as there is no engine but that in the barrack, which is some distance from the town.  
Lord Riversdale's estates in the County Cork, comprising 7800 acres, rental £1,500 a year, are to be brought to the hammer, next month.  
There will be a quarterly Court of the Bank of Ireland, to-morrow.  
The Earl of Clancarty has given £50, Lord Clonbrock £50, Sir R. Mahon, and other noblemen and gentlemen, sums varying from £20 to £1 towards a Farming Society in Ballinasloe, having for its object improvements in farming stock of all descriptions, and in the system of agriculture principally among the poorer classes. Lord Clancarty was in the chair.  
Mr. Manning, of Athlone, was fined by the local Magistrates 40s. for keeping a gambling table at his house in that town, for the corruption of youth.  
The Connaught Club will dine, as usual, at Ballinasloe Fair—Sir Michael Dillon Bellew, a repealer, president.  
The Patriotic Assurance Company report an addition of £14,000 to their invested capital, last six months.  
A deputation of Frenchmen has been to Belfast, in the last week, to inquire into the state of the Linen Trade, and to report to their Government thereon.  
It has been intimated from an official quarter, that had Government known Sir Michael Dillon Bellew would become an adherent of the Repeal agitation, they would never have conferred a Baronetcy upon him.  
Lord Morpeth will arrive in Dublin this week. Mr. Helps, the Private Secretary, has preceded him. The final close of the Royal Victoria Gallery is announced. We congratulate Messrs. EXTRAORDINARY DISEASE IN A HORSE.—Yesterday, an immense tumour, composed of dense layers of a yellowish oily fat, was cut off the inside base of the tongue, where it joins the windpipe, of a very valuable thorough bred horse belonging to Mr. Vanderkiste, Collector of Customs. The poor animal was for some days unable to swallow anything, and was in consequence rapidly wasting, and must ultimately have died. Two Medical gentlemen who merely visited the sufferer as a matter of curiosity, in a comparative point of view, ventured to cut the tumour out, which they succeeded in accomplishing, and a moment after the horse rose off the ground, spat up this extraordinary tumour, fully as large as a Seville orange, and drank a quantity of water. To reach the tumour it required the entire length of the arm inside the teeth. This is perhaps the most extraordinary disease ever known to have existed in such a situation. The horse is at Mr. D. Barrington's stables, Pery-square, and doing well.  
The Treasurer of the Ennis Lying-in Hospital acknowledges to have received from Colonel Wyndham, per Thomas Crowe, Esq. £50. in aid of the funds of that institution.

The Rev. Hugh Stowell intends moving for another trial, in the libel case of Hearne v. Stowell.  
The Rev. Hugh M'Neile is attending at Belfast a meeting of the Society for propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts.  
One of the most disgraceful and wanton outrages was perpetrated in the Scots Church, Clonmel, on Friday night. It appears that some miscreant succeeded in effecting an entrance into this neat and ornamental building, by taking out one of the large panes of glass. The pulpit cushion and window curtains were torn, and indecencies, calculated to degrade the greatest barbarian that ever existed, were committed.  
Dr. Shuttleworth, warden of New College, Oxford, is to be the new Bishop of Chichester.  
Mr. J. D. Sullivan, a Roman Catholic, conformed to the Established Church at Templenoe, Kerry, on Sunday, when he was received into communion by the Rev. N. Bland, curate of the parish. The convert has since incurred the incessant persecution of his neighbours.  
Miles Coverdale, Bishop of Exeter, and the translator of the first Bible which received the royal sanction, was in early life an Augustine monk, but was converted to Protestantism, and exerted his best faculties and influence in advocating its cause.  
The Right Rev. Dr. Ryan is to hold a conference with his Clergy in this City to-morrow week.  
The National Board has made a grant to the Parish Priest of Killee for a school-house.  
The Roman Catholic Archbishop of Tuam has made the following appointments to missions—The Rev. Mr. M'Namara (late of Corofin), to the Curacy of Athery; Rev. Mr. Fergus to Joyce Country; Rev. The Very Rev. T. Mathew has promised to administer the Temperance pledge in the town of Bruff, to-morrow, at ten o'clock. A very numerous attendance of postulants is expected, as the Very Rev. Mr. Cussen, P.P. has apprised all the surrounding clergymen of the Very Rev. Gentleman's intended visit.  
At Ballylongford Petty Sessions, on Monday, Wm. Sandes, Patrick Cheevers, James Crosbie, and T. P. Vokes, Esqrs. presiding magistrates. Informations were taken against Patrick Hickey, and Maurice Moynihan, for an assault on the artillery-men, as detailed in Saturday's Chronicle. The parties to be admitted to bail as soon as Gunner M'Knight is declared out of danger, by a medical certificate.  
During Monday and yesterday three thousand quarters of Foreign wheat were released from bond, in Waterford, at 2s. 8d. duty.  
The Grand Orange Lodge of Dublin, Richard Smith, Esq. Master, have resolved—That the repeal of the Legislative Union between Great Britain and Ireland appears to us a sure means of establishing a Roman Catholic government in Ireland, and we will oppose such a repeal by every lawful means, upon the same principle which led us to oppose the measure of Catholic Emancipation.  
At Newcastle Petty Sessions, on Friday, Michael Garvey, Edmond Ryan and Edmond Hayes found guilty of robbing Mr. Locke's garden, were sentenced—Garvey, three months and hard labour; Hayes and Ryan, one month. Morgan Creagan and Timothy Sullivan were fined 1s. each, on the complaint of Acting-Constable Bullen, for not having their dogs logged; John Burke fined 1s. each, on the complaint of Sub-Constable Lowes, of Ardagh, for having stones on the public road. There were more persons fined on the complaint of Constable Glin, of Ardagh, for not having their carts lettered according to law. Informations were ordered against Johanna D'Arcy, of Knockaderry, for stealing potatoes from Henry Smith, seized under a civil bill decree.
