was replied to by the Solicitor General, who adverted strongly on the palpable contradiction between all the evidence adduced to prove the alibi. A few minutes after the Jury retired—*Guilty*.

Wednesday, Sept. 7.—John Killan, and John M'Kenna, otherwise John M'Kenna, were put to the bar on charges of High Treason.

After swearing the Jury, Robert Emmet, Esq. came to the bar, and arraigned on a charge of High Treason. Being asked by the Court what name he would have assigned for him, he named James Curran and Mr. George Ponsonby; but on being informed that Mr. Ponsonby having gone to the county of Tipperary, could not be in town to attend to him, the prisoner then named William M'Connell, Esq.; for whom Mr. Attorney General

the Crown would permit at any reasonable price Mr. Ponsonby, if the prisoner wished it, to be retained. The prisoner chose Mr. Leonard M'Connell as his Agent.

Lord Norbury then appointed Wednesday next to receive the prisoner brought up to plead, and take his plea forthwith, unless some substantial reason should be offered to have it postponed.

The Prime Serjeant then stated the case for the prisoner, and recapitulated the narrative which the Attorney General gave of the transaction against the prisoner.

In his cross-examination by Mr. M'Nally, an unusual circumstance occurred, respecting the manner by which the witness effected his escape:—The particular pike-man more attentive to watching the prisoner's movements than any of his companions, attracted his particular notice—witness had some cash about him, viz. 20s. in silver, guinea and half note, also a guinea note, all of which he offered the man to facilitate his escape—this proposal the pike-man at first rejected, damning the witness, and alleging he did not want his money—

The man at length consented, and while he was receiving the silver and notes from the witness held the pike to his breast, and took the sharp end of the pike which had been forced on the witness, and held it in his hands, fearful, as it appeared to him, to offend the witness with the use of it—witness at a convenient opportunity, took occasion to run down the street, near the corn-market of Thomas-street, and holding the pike he held with the pike-man.

Michael Mahaffy identified the prisoner Killin, as the person who had piked one of the men whom he saw in Dirty-lane, lying on the ground bleeding and groaning, and the prisoner M'Connell, as the man who fired a long pistol at another man, whom he saw in the same predicament—he saw Rourke kill the pike-man.
