She was married, in the year 1776, to Henry, Viscount Boyle, now Earl of Shannon, and since that period has uniformly exhibited a bright example of every domestic virtue. He yielded his neck and gentle spirit into the hands of his Redeemer without a struggle, and with a smile; displaying the conviction resting on his mind that his bliss in eternity would be complete, and confirmed by the all powerful mediation of a blessed Redeemer.
